Assessor Everett Harshman says his office has completed appraisals on over half the residential properties but has not got at business appraisals yet. He spoke from behind a huge stack of personal property returns which were piled high on his desk.

The health department has finished the second Heppner school clinic and is preparing for Irrigon and Boardman clinics next week. Letters are being sent to parents of pre-school children.

This department conducts free blood pressure clinics the first Wednesday afternoon of each month in Heppner at the Degree of Honor Building between the Lebusch Shoppe and the First National Bank. Pat Wright, R.N., officiates. On the third Wednesday afternoon Pat checks blood pressure in the United Church of Christ in Ione. Both checking sessions begin at 3 p.m. and end when there are no more customers.

The busy planning commission met with the city councils of Lexington, Ione and Irrigon at the request of the State Department of Commerce to establish uniform procedures for processing and issuing building permits. The objective of the meeting, held in the Lexington School, March 10, was to adopt standardized procedures to supply information regarding zoning, sewer facilities, water facilities and fire facilities to be compiled and to accompany building permit applications. The Department of Commerce hopes that by doing this delays and confusion can be avoided.

The county planning department also discussed the procedures that have been implemented in the county office and the forms employed, together with examples of other city and county forms and procedures.

Planner David Moon called a special meeting of the Special Ad Hoc Committee and the Advisory Committee on Housing on March 12 at 8 p.m., at the Morrow County office at Park Drive Inn in Irrigon. The objective of this second meeting of the Ad Hoc Committee was to formalize a recommended revision to the Morrow County Comprehensive Plan in regard to rural and urban residential development.

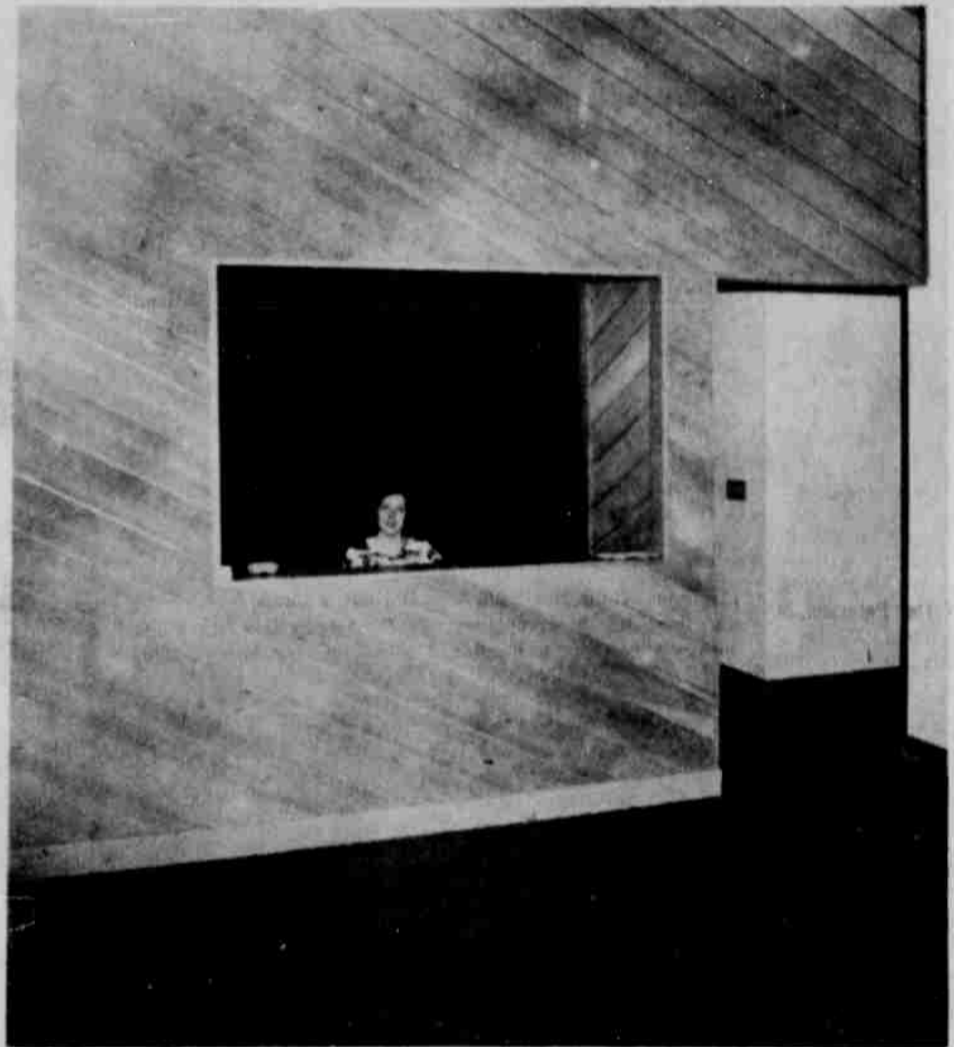
