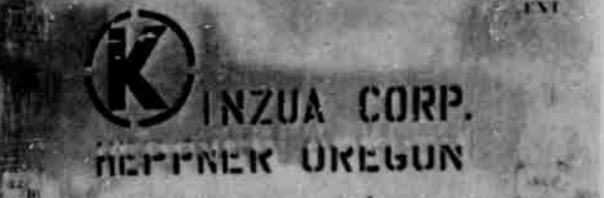
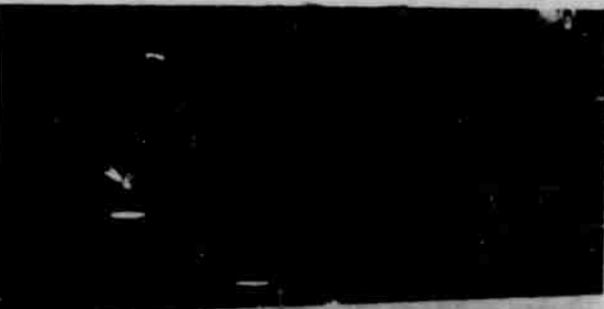
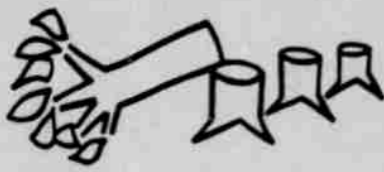


Kinzua's . . .
