Traffic citations are up

Traffic citations are up 300 per cent over this period last year, according to Charles O'Connor, justice of the peace. O'Connor said that so far this year 114 citations have been issued compared to 38 this time last year.

He reported that during March the following cases were filed in his court: civil cases, 3; major traffic violations, 23; minor traffic violations, 23; and small claims, 7. The following cases were settled in court without trial: civil cases, 3; major traffic, 1; minor traffic, 31; small claims, 6.

The discrepancy in the number of minor traffic cases closed is due to the carryover of violations from the preceding months.

Angling closure adopted

Because of anticipated low returns of fish, the Oregon Wildlife Commission closed the Columbia, Deschutes, and Snake River and Snake River tributaries to angling for salmon 12 inches or greater in length from April 1 through July 31.

The Columbia River will be closed to angling for steelhead 20 inches and over during the same period. The Snake River and tributaries are already closed through Aug. 31 for steelhead angling to protect spawning fish from last year's poor run.

The commission took the action on March 21 following a public hearing and a review by its staff indicating anticipated returns of fish destined for spawning grounds in the upper Snake River system will be below levels needed for re-populating the runs. Public testimony at the meeting generally favored the closure.

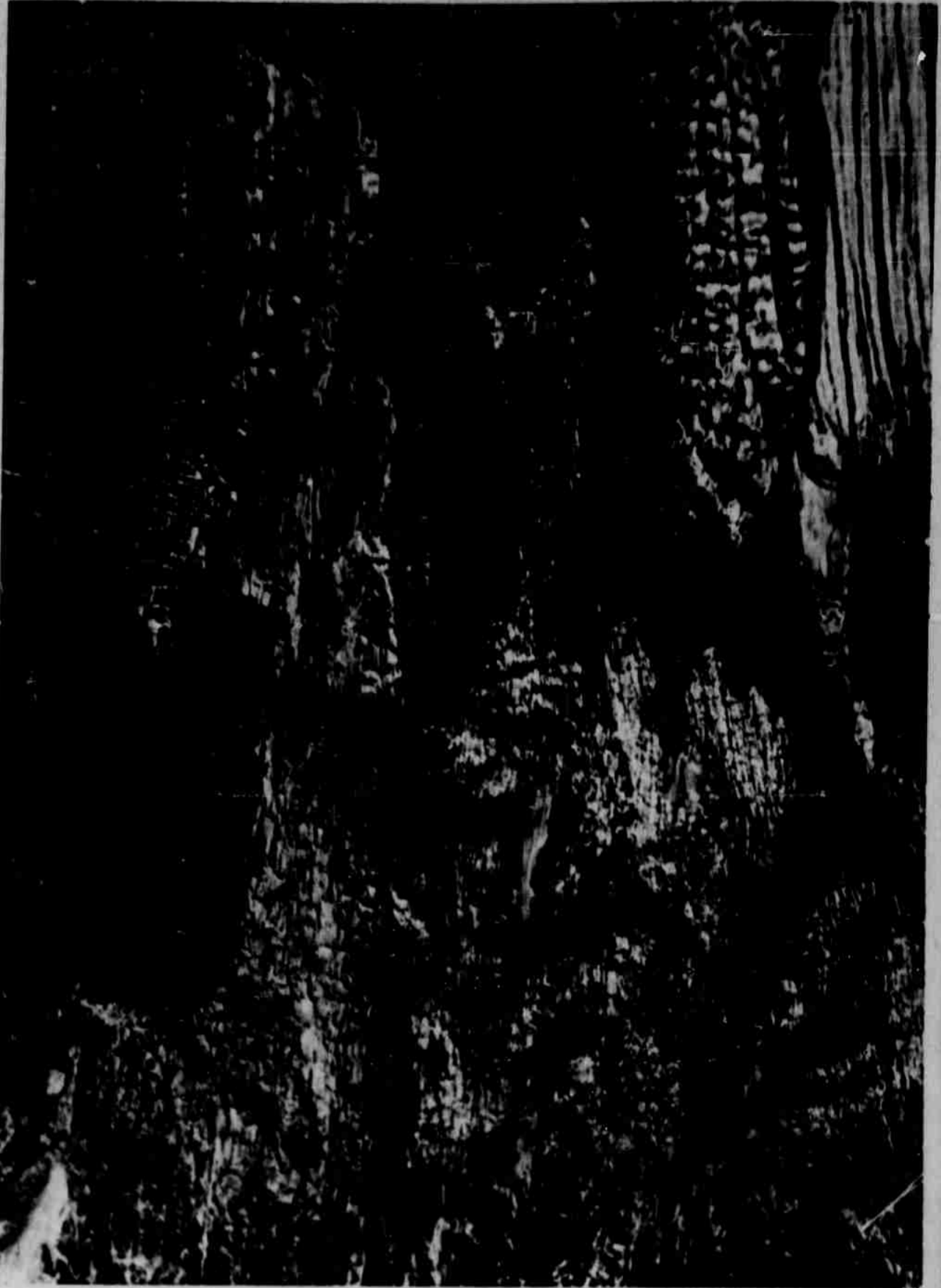
Fisheries management agencies in Washington and Idaho plan similar closures and the Fish Commission of Oregon has announced it plans no commercial season during the closure period.

Bob Sayre of the Wildlife Commission's fisheries staff explained the problem. Any given year's run of anadromous fish in the Columbia River, he said, consists largely of three age classes of fish. There are those fish that have spent one year in salt water, others that return after two years in the ocean, and a third group that return after three years at sea.

Sayre pointed out that heavy mortality occurred to out-migrating salmon and steelhead juveniles in 1971, '72, and '73. In 1971 and 1972 the losses were due largely to nitrogen supersaturation contributed by new Snake River dams. In 1973 losses were because of extremely low water flows during which many smolts passed through slotted bulkheads or turbines at the dams and because the low water slowed outmigration so predation was heavier than normal.
