Court house notes

A big change is taking place outside the courthouse. Part of the park at the rear of the building is being converted into parking space for 20 more cars. Some residents who are accustomed to summer picnics in that park dislike seeing the soft being removed and the park area being greatly reduced in size. Maybe this is progress?

Office of Justice of the Peace, Charles O'Connor, is located at the head of the stairway. O'Connor has had cataract surgery at Pendleton Community Hospital, and since Easter Sunday is recuperating at home in Ione. During his absence Dee Gribble is presiding over the office.

The Juvenile Department learned that some suspected marijuana sales in the county have turned out to be sales of finely chopped alfalfa laced with a few marijuana seeds. The suspected material was sent to the Oregon State Crime Lab. for analysis and the report came back last week.

Juvenile Director, Carolyn Davis, after approval by the Juvenile Advisory Committee, is to make arrangements for a group trip of youth and others to visit the McLaughlin School for juvenile delinquents near Woodburn. More trips may be planned at a later date. She states that possibly 10 to 13 persons could go on the field trip at one time. Several members of the Juvenile Advisory Council along with Miss Davis were visitors at the state institution last Fall.

During the week hearings were held on two shoplifting charges and the juveniles involved were placed on probation and are now being handled by the juvenile department. Hearings on two

burglaries, involving three juveniles will come up soon.
