HHS trackmen make showing

One school record was set and two others nearly fell as the Heppner High School trackmen turned in outstanding performances Saturday in Salem at the Willamette Relays.

Dave McLeod broke his own record in the high jump with a leap of 6'1" and placed third overall in the A competition. His old record was 5'10", set last year. McLeod also turned in the top individual performance by earning a third-place finish in the high hurdles with a time of 1:16.9 and was on the winning 800 and mile relay teams.

It was in the two relay events that other school records were narrowly missed. Ray Cate, Dave McLeod, Carl Christian and Wade Padberg ran 1:38.2 in the 800 relay to win the event and missed the record by two-tenths of a second. Ray Cate, Tom Wolff, Dave McLeod and Wade Padberg combined for a 3:41.1 running of the mile relay for another first place, one and one-tenth seconds off the H.H.S. mark.

The Mustang 440 relay team of Ray Cate, Steve McLaughlin, Carl Christian and Wade Padberg finished second in their heat but fifth overall in a time of 1:48.2. Also placing in the meet in novice competition (those who have not lettered in track) were Randy Devine, first in discus with a toss of 107'3"; Kyle Buschke was fifth in the same event with 92'2"; Mike Smith was fourth in the novice shotput with 35'7".

Other competing were Dan Marshall throwing in the senior discus and shot with marks of 117'11" and 35'9", respectively. Mike Smith, novice discus, 76'7", and Mary Smith, novice discus and shot with throws of 89'6" and 33'4" respectively. Randy Devine also threw the javelin in novice, 122', just missing sixth place. "If the boys continue to compete with the same intensity they did Saturday, we will have a fine track season", said Head Coach Chuck Starr.

The Mustangs competed against Amity, Canyonville Bible Academy, Colton, Jefferson, John F. Kennedy, Monroe, Pine-Eagle, Regis, Salem Academy, Santiam, St. Paul, Western Mennonite and Mt. Angel Prep. There were also AA and AAA schools competing in their own class. Next Saturday the Mustangs will be competing in a four-way meet in The Dalles against Wabtonka, Goldendale, Wa., and Dufur.
