SEALED bids will be received until 5:00 o'clock P.M., on the 25th day of April, 1975, at the office of the Town Recorder in the City Hall of Lexington, Oregon, and immediately thereafter publicly opened, in the Council Chambers at said City Hall, for the purchase of an issue of Bonds of the Town of Lexington, Morrow County, Oregon, in the aggregate principal amount of \$115,000.00 par value. The proceeds of the Bonds will be used to acquire, construct, repair, extend and improve the water system of said Town of Lexington, Oregon. The Bonds are to be in the denomination of \$1,000 each, dated October 1, 1975, at the date of delivery at the option of the purchaser, and shall bear interest at the rate not to exceed 5 per cent per annum.

The Farmers Home Administration has agreed to purchase the Bonds if no acceptable bid is received. In the event the Farmers Home Administration purchases the Bonds, or any portion thereof, the Bonds so purchased may be in the form of one or more installment Bonds and shall bear such dates and be issued in such principal installments as the Town Council may hereafter provide by Ordinance.

Said Bonds will be sold to the highest responsible bidder and for not less than their par value and the entire amount of accrued interest thereon, and to the bidder offering the lowest effective interest rate to the Town taking into consideration and account such premiums as are offered by the bidder in connection with the purchase of the Bonds, with interest being computed to the respective maturity dates. The bid must contain a statement of the net interest cost under the terms of the bid.

WOOD TICKS

Wood ticks are again seasonally present in and about many outdoor recreational areas and hiking trails throughout Oregon. These parasites occur most frequently from February to July in a variety of Oregon habitats with high populations found along trails and roads. Ticks rest on grasses and low vegetation awaiting the opportunity to attach themselves to people or animals that brush against the plant. The bite from a wood tick may cause localized irritation, possible secondary infections or one of several infectious diseases such as Colorado tick fever and Rocky Mountain spotted fever. The longer a tick is attached to a person, the greater the potential for disease transmission.

Some protection from ticks can be afforded individuals when in tick infested areas by making periodic inspections of clothing throughout the day and a thorough inspection of the body for ticks at least twice daily.

Wearing boots and keeping shirts tucked into trousers and trousers tucked into boots may also keep ticks on the outer clothing where they may be observed and removed. Ticks that have been attached for brief periods of time may often be removed by exerting a steady gentle pull to the tick. Since the body fluid of ticks may contain infectious organisms, crushing the ticks with subsequent contamination of the wound should be avoided. It is generally advisable to consult a physician for the removal of a tick that is firmly attached.

More than a year of planning by the ranch and the AHA has gone into the development of the most unique and innovative program.

Included in the festivities will be a tour of the ranch operation, beginning at 2 p.m. on June 27, followed by the American Junior Hereford Association national showmanship contest preliminaries at 5 p.m. The first afternoon's activities will be capped with a hamburger fry at the ranch, as well as a junior dance with a five band, commencing at 9 a.m. and following an on-the-ranch continental-style breakfast at 7 a.m. Saturday's activities will revolve around one of the most unique judging contests ever to be incorporated into a field day program. Patterned after the 1974 Denver Hereford Conference, 15 of the nation's Hereford industry leaders will evaluate classes by means of the three-man committee system used by the AHA at selected register of merit shows this past season.

Equally as unusual to a program of this type will be the actual use of performance data on each animal by both contestants and judges in placing classes, which will include pen bulls, cow-calf pairs and replacement heifer selection among others.

Other activities will include addresses by top-rated agriculture industry leaders, public speaking contests, skills, and something "different" in the form of entertainment.
