Career education program studied

Members of the Morrow County School Board, school administrators and student representatives from Morrow County High Schools met in Hermiston on Thursday, April 3 with representatives from Umatilla, Stanfield, Hermiston and Echo to hear details of a study which is soon to be conducted in the two county area.

The focus of the study is to determine the feasibility of interdistrict efforts in the development of career education programs.

The study, which has been approved by boards of each of the school districts, has been planned under a grant from the State Department of Education.

The group heard Leo Meyers, a former State Department of Education employee, explain how he will approach the study.

Mr. Meyers will be conducting personal interviews throughout the area during the next two weeks. He plans to interview board members, school administrators, parents, teachers and students.

The study is designed to lay the groundwork for a future program which may provide a broader offering of career opportunities to students in small high schools where enrollment is limited.

Mental Health Clinic has heavy case load

"When I first started working as director of the Mental Health Clinic, in Heppner last October, I had some reservations about the number of people that would come into the office for consultation. Today, six months later the case load is staggering and I could use the services of another professional man," said Terri Hirni, director of the Mental Health program in Morrow County.

His present workload consists of a 10-12 hour day, six days a week, or about one full week of overtime for every four weeks worked. He is spending 26 hours per month in various schools throughout the county with the exception of Heppner High School, for consultations. At Heppner High School he has an answering service and makes appointments from the service provided him.

In most counties in Oregon, there is one professional man for every 2,000 people; however, in Morrow County with a population exceeding 5,000 people he is working alone.

Hirni would like to have another professional man

helping him, and would also like to set up a rehabilitation center on alcohol and the problems it presents to the residents of the county. There would be a program for persons arrested for driving while under the influence of liquor, along with a program for the education and the rehabilitation to help the offender get an occupational drivers license returned.

"Alcohol presents a serious problem to the community and should not be treated lightly," said Hirni.

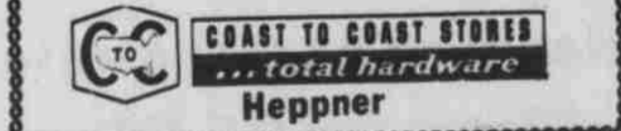
