The Oregon State Division of the American Association of University Women will hold its annual convention in Medford on April 17, 18 and 19.

The local delegates will be assisting the Pendleton Branch in its bid for the 1977 convention site. The local branch voted at its April meeting to co-host the 1977 convention with Pendleton should the Pendleton site be selected.
