Leila Palmer gave tips for gardening activities in April. She especially warned members to start spraying for disease and insects early. It is hest to spray early or late in the day and only if there is no

The care and propagation of chrysanthemums was the topic of the day. Helen Martin gave some of the following pointers: until July 15 one may "pinch back" mums that are 6 inches tall to make a stronger and more compact plant. Put plants about 3-4 mehes apart and label. Plant in a sunny location in well deained soil and water regularly. It is best to divide plants each year but at least every three years and use outside rooted sprouts, not old wood. Aphid and mildew seem to be the most common problems. These can be controlled by troing spray or systemic material for aphids. To prevent mildew one may dust with sulphur, spray with special commercial spray and always do morning watering.
