## Child Development Center will hold open house

The Heppner Child Development Center will hold an open house April 21-25, from 2 to 6 p.m. daily. The general public, especially parents are invited to come to the open house, look over the center and have punch and cookies.

As an added bonus, the center is offering four hours of free child care per child, for each family attending the open house. The time must be taken in one four-hour block, during the week of the open house. Regular users, as well as interested visitors will be granted this service.

The center, located at the Seventh Day Adventist School auditorium in Heppner, is a

non-profit, independently run facility. The Center has been in operation since October, 1974. It was organized by a group of interested local people through the help of the L.C. Council in Pendleton.

According to center director, Monica Swanson, while there is a basic daily charge per child for use of the center, many families find they qualify for financial aid and needn't pay the full \$4 per day or \$2.50 per half-day for one child.

Each day the children are given two nutritional meals and snacks. The child care center is arranged into interest areas with a craft corner, reading area, rough-housing area, numbers and letters

corner, dress-up section and creative play area. There are also a separate infant-toddler section and a large fenced yard.

Anyone who has been to the Heppner Child Development Center feels that words can't describe it adequately. "To see it is to appreciate it," says Linda Johnson, chairman of the HCDC board. "We hope families will take this opportunity to look over the child care center."

Leila Palmer gave tips for gardening activities in April. She especially warned members to start spraying for disease and insects early. It is best to spray early or late in the day and only if there is no wind.

The care and propagation of chrysanthemums was the topic of the day. Helen Martin gave some of the following pointers: until July 15 one may "pinch back" mums that are 6 inches tall to make a stronger and more compact plant. Put plants about 3-4 inches apart and label. Plant in a sunny location in well drained soil and water regularly. It is best to divide plants each year but at least every three years and use outside rooted sprouts, not old wood. Aphid and mildew seem to be the most common problems. These can be controlled by using spray or systemic material for aphids. To prevent mildew one may dust with sulphur, spray with special commercial spray and always do morning watering.

In each department budget thoughts were foremost. Several persons expressed concern as to whether the complete budget could be kept within the 6 per cent limitation.

Budget hearings and work toward the acceptance of all department budgets and the complete county budget will require at least three days. Besides the county court, the budget committee, and each of the department heads, the hearings should involve concerned citizens who are urged to attend these open meetings. County Clerk Sadie Parrish says that although they began hearings at 9:00 on Tuesday, Wednesday and today (Thursday) are expected to be more significant than the opening day. The hearings may run into tomorrow, too.

Judge Paul Jones spent a long weekend away from his desk before the budget hassle began.

Assessor Harshman says his office is ready for the hearings. He hopes that their new man, Tom Stewart, will help the office get by without contracting for outside appraisers.

The planning department is working on solid waste disposal improvements. Planner David Moon had a meeting with the mayors of each county town set for last night, April 16, to discuss matters concerned with waste disposal.
