High volatile 2, 4D restrictions explained

Restrictions on the use of high volatile forms of the herbicide, 2, 4-D, were published this week by the Oregon Department of Agriculture.

The restrictions, which prohibit the use of these forms of the herbicide for 120 days following April 5, 1975, in certain areas of Morrow and Umatilla Counties, were adopted by the department under an emergency temporary order.

The action followed a series of five hearings held in March in five Columbia Basin Counties. The original proposal, aimed at avoiding drift damage to grapes in the tri-cities area of Washington, would have prohibited the use of high volatile 2,4-Ds in all five counties from April 1 to October 31.

Hearings officer Bill Kosean in his findings, said, "There is some, but not conclusive, evidence of damage to grape planting caused by the application of high volatile esters of 2,4-D both in the northern border areas of Oregon and south central Washington. The lack of conclusiveness of present research and investigatory data and evidence precludes justification for a prohibition or restriction other than in the northerly portions of Morrow and Umatilla Counties".

He said the existence of the East Umatilla Chemical Control District precludes the necessity of applying the restrictions to that area.

The area covered by the temporary order is "all lands situated north of Interstate Highway 80N within the counties of Morrow and Umatilla, excluding lands presently subject to the East Umatilla Chemical Control District".

The order does not apply to low volatile or amine forms of 2,4-D. Those affected by the order are the "high volatile esters of 2,4-D (2,4-Dichlorophenoxyacetic acid), and including the methyl, ethyl, propyl, butyl and amyl esters thereof".

The order says, in effect, no one shall use the prohibited forms of 2,4-D in the restricted

area during the 120-day period without first having applied for and received a permit from the Oregon Department of Agriculture. The special exception permits will be granted only for the eradication or control of sagebrush or rabbit brush and then only after it has been determined that the herbicide will not adversely affect grape crops.

Time to remove studded tires

The Oregon State Highway Division today reminded motorists that the use of studded tires on highways within the state is forbidden by statute after April 30. Motorists are asked to remove their studded tires as soon as possible, if weather conditions permit, to avoid damage to the highway system.
