Calling beef the "anti-inflation food" Ms. Bradshaw stated that in spite of low prices, the beef industry is here to stay. She commended ranch wives for the part they play in maintaining the cattle ranches of Oregon.

Also attending the luncheon to report on state activities was CowBelle State 4-H chairman, Pat Anderson, Arlington. Ms. Anderson reported that new information had been supplied to each Extension office in Oregon, for beef education work with 4-H members.

The annual luncheon is also time for reports of local activities, with many new events reported for the spring months. A new project to be undertaken, with CowBelles Sheri Mahoney and Meg Murray as chairmen, will be printing of napkins with county brands, as an alternate to the placemats widely used locally. Livestock growers may purchase a space on the napkins for their brands by contacting one of the two chairwomen as soon as cost estimates are received. County reports were given on beef for Father's Day, beef education in schools, beef certificate sales, beef promo-

tion and publicity. Local newspaper and correspondents were thanked for their assistance in publicizing CowBelles events, and businesses for their support of activities. Plans for the Beef-A-Rama on April 30 were announced. The salad luncheon, served by women of the Episcopal Guild, was attended by approximately 35 CowBelles and guests.

Two regional winners will be selected from recipes submitted, from each of the four Oregon regions to participate in a cook-off in Portland on June 7. Winner of the state cook-off will receive an all expense paid trip to Denver to take part in a national cook off, with a \$1,000 first prize.

Rules of the contest are:

1. Contestants must be at least 21 years of age.
2. Contestants may not hold a professional food status.
3. Recipe must feature beef cuts from round, rump, or chuck.
4. Recipe must contain a minimum of two pounds, but not more than six pounds of beef.
5. No brand names may be listed as ingredients.
6. Recipe must include the number of servings, and cost per serving.
7. Recipe may require up to four hours preparation time.
8. Recipes for outdoor beef cookery will not be accepted.
9. All recipes become the property of the national CowBelles.
10. All entries must be submitted by May 1 to Mary Seida, 17501 S.E. Forest Hills Drive, Clackamas, Or., 97015.

## Voter numbers down in County

Figures released by the secretary of state show a decline in the total number of registered voters for Morrow County.

Registration at the end of December 1974 showed 1,332 Democrats, 985 Republicans and 117 under the "other" heading. At the end of February 1975 the Democrats lost 4 for a total of 1,328. At the same time the Republicans lost 18 while the "other" group remained at 117. There was a total loss of 18 voters.

This comes at a time when the County is showing growth, but not in registrations.

## Irrigon

Principal Mike Tolar spoke to the parents of sixth grade students Thursday evening. He informed them of the week long outdoor education class, May 5-9, at the Tupper Guard Center near Heppner. Last year was the first time this type of program had been tried in Morrow County and it was termed a success.

Outdoor education provides for first-hand learning experience in the out-of-doors. It is not a frill to education nor primarily a recreation program. It is a means of enriching regular instruction rather than a replacement of formal textbook instruction.

The major portion of the outdoor education curriculum deals with science and conservation. The outdoor setting also offers learning experiences in health, language arts, arithmetic, social studies and other phases of the school curriculum. Students will

have 4 1/2 hours of direct instruction each day plus additional time with their regular teachers and student counselors. This provides the equivalent to the regular school day. It promises to be an enriching experience for the students.

Students will be housed in cabins and will sleep on double decked bunks with mattresses provided. Each unit includes modern lavatory facilities, shower, activities area, flagpole and campfire areas. Student counselors from Riverside High School will live

## Old food stamp use extended

On March 1, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) began issuing a new series of food stamps in denominations of \$1, \$5, and \$10. The new series was scheduled to completely replace the old series (50 cents, \$1, and \$5) by July 1, 1975. USDA's Food and Nutrition Service has extended the transition from old to new series food stamps for 60 days because of unexpected production and transportation difficulties.

Until Sept. 1, 1975, both the old and new series food stamps may be used by participating food stamp households and accepted by authorized grocers. After that date only the new series stamps are acceptable. Banks may accept the old series stamps for redemption from authorized grocers until Oct. 1, 1975.
