At 11:45 a.m., 150 seniors and council personnel from Morrow and Umatilla communities were seated for lunch in the Presbyterian Church. After visiting with friends from various areas, partaking in a good meal and meeting new friends, the group went to the Blue Mountain Community College campus.

The visitors were directed to the theater in Pioneer Hall. They were greeted by Mary Davis, nutritional coordinator for the area's Citizens Action Program. They viewed a film on BMCC which included colored pictures of each community in the two-county area and were given an explanation of the college's philosophy, its many programs and its future hopes.

Ron Daniels, BMCC president gave a special welcome

Tours were arranged by Gene Ann McLean and student body officer guides to various departments of the college. Many of the guests visited the museum in the basement of Pioneer Hall.
