Life interesting for students

Oregon State University's first students to join a student-faculty exchange program with Lincoln College in New Zealand have one word for their new life: Busy.

All five are agriculture students at OSU. In January, they left Corvallis for Christchurch, arriving in time to do work on farms and get settled before the school term began March 3.

In a recent letter to James Oldfield, head of the OSU Department of Animal Science who helped set up the exchange program, Clinton Krebs, a junior in agricultural economics from Ione, said the OSU students were finding their classes extremely interesting.

All five are enrolled in husbandry classes including crop, pasture and sheep production and farm management but all are taking other subjects.

Many courses at Lincoln College encompass a broader range of disciplines than do courses at OSU and the students said they are being exposed to training in communications, entomology, microbiology, soils and agricultural engineering. They

spend 28-30 hours a week in lecture classes and take field trips.

The students have recommended that their successors for the program be selected earlier so they can adjust their fall term schedules to fit more smoothly into subjects taught in New Zealand.

In addition to their studies, the Oregonians are seeing New Zealand. During the May 9-25 holidays they will tour North Island and some hope for a short visit to Australia.

The four male students play basketball in a city league and two—Krebs and Dale Killingsworth, a junior in agricultural engineering from Fossil—are playing rugby, New Zealand's national game.

It is hoped that the first New Zealand contingent of students will arrive on the OSU campus in September. The five OSU students will complete their final examinations Nov. 8 and plan to return to Oregon by Christmas. At the midpoint of their first term at Lincoln College, would they recommend the exchange program?

The answer: "Anyone who does come is definitely in for a worthwhile experience."

Veterans may correct records

The Veterans Administration today reminded veterans of their right to request correction of what they feel are errors or injustices in their military records.

Application must be submitted to the branch in which the veteran served, but VA can provide the necessary Department of Defense form, DD-149, "Application for Correction of Military or Naval Record."

It was pointed out that while some errors may seem insignificant, correction of others could prove important, resulting in eligibility for VA and other benefits.

Generally, veterans are expected to file requests for correction within three years, but this deadline may be waived in interest of justice. Applications may be filed by the veteran, survivors, or legal representatives.

Seven mothers took part in last Sunday's worship service at the United Methodist Church. May 11 was a special Sunday in four ways. Besides being Mother's Day, it was Christian Home Sunday; the church observed International Woman's Year, and it was the day for the monthly mission report.

Savings bond sales are up

U.S. Savings Bonds sales in Oregon for the past three months of the year set an all-time peace-time record for the state.

Through the first three months, Oregonians purchased \$16,576,062 worth of bonds. This is an increase of \$1,650,000 over the like period of 1974, which was a record year. Currently, Oregon ranks Number 2 in the nation in per capita sales of U.S. Savings Bonds.

The Oregon Savings Bond office says there is no single reason for the stimulated sales. More employers are installing the Payroll Savings Plan for their people than ever before, but at the same time, the over-the-counter sales in the banks and financial institutions are enjoying similar growth.

Probably, the major contributing factor to the stimulated activity is that Oregonians are becoming aware of the fact that the 6 per cent interest rate does not tell the whole Savings Bonds story. Because of the tax advantage of Savings Bonds being exempt from state and local taxes, plus the privilege of deferring payment of tax on accumulated interest for federal tax purposes until bonds are redeemed, the income on Savings Bonds is greatly enhanced. This advantage, plus the total security of Savings Bonds, makes them attractive as an investment.

Write about tornado

Mr. and Mrs. Terrel Bengt received a letter from his daughter, Mrs. George McDonald of Omaha, Nebraska, telling of the damage caused there by the recent tornado. Information from the letter, dated May 9, follows.

The tornado hit a 2,000 sq. block area. It was 8 blocks wide. 5,226 people are homeless. 35,000 are without electricity. 700 homes demolished. over 1,000 homes damaged and over 100 businesses damaged or demolished.

Two schools were completely demolished; six others were closed because of broken windows and roof damage.

The National Guard is in force and expected to be there through this week. Streets are closed and curfews are being enforced. The Salvation Army and Red Cross, civic organizations, and volunteers are all helping. Boys Town, motels and apartments opened their doors to the homeless.

Three persons were killed. It is believed that the early warning saved many lives.
