## Mustang cindermen off to State track meet

Heppner qualified eight individuals in 11 events to the state Class "A" boys track and field meet at Pleasant Hill this weekend, May 16-17. The qualifications were made at the district 7-A meet held at Condon last Saturday.

In team scoring, Sherman County made a very strong showing in the running events to overcome a strong Heppner bid for the championship. Final overall scoring was Sherman County 129, Heppner 111, Condon 56, Weston-McEwen 54, Wasco County 38, Umatilla 32, Umpine 24, Helix 22, Echo 20, Pilot Rock 19, Ione 12, Riverside 6.

The Mustangs had some outstanding individual efforts as H.H.S. thinclads broke two district records and tied a third.

David McLeod was the meet's only triple winner with victories in the high and low hurdles and set a new record in the high jump of 6-3 to also win that event. His 15.9 running in the highs was his best mark ever. McLeod ran 21.3 in the lows.

Wade Padberg set a new standard in the 440-yard dash with a clocking of :50.9. He also qualified in the 800 with a second-place time of 2:05.2. Tying the meet record in

the pole vault was Carl Christman with an 11'6" effort and a blue ribbon. Jerry Gentry was the other first-place finisher with a toss of 175'2" in the javelin.

Dewayne McClain earned a spot in the state meet with a second-place finish in the mile run. His time was 4:50.5. Clayton Wilson qualified in the 100-yard dash with a :10.4 clocking and was picked for a third.

Both Heppner relay teams are entered in the state meet as a result of second place finishes. The 440-relay team of Christman, Steve McLaughlin, Wilson and Padberg ran a season's best of :46.3. John

Other place finishers for the Mustangs were Dan Marshall, third in the discus with 117'2"; Wolff, fourth in the 800, 2:09.4; Dave Allstott, fifth in the triple jump, 40'1"; and Kilkenny, sixth in the 440 in :56.5.

Allstott's jump in the triple jump is a school record. Although this is a new event for Oregon schools, there have been H.H.S. triple jumpers against Washington schools. Charlie McElligott, Ione, also earned a trip to the state meet placing second in the low hurdles with a time of :21.4.

## Soroptimists learn about sale of wheat to orient

The Soroptimists learned some facts about the sale of wheat to oriental countries. Milton Morgan, Ione, showed colored slides with accompanying narration at their May 8 luncheon. He answered questions about wheat sales past and about possible sales in the future.

Morgan spoke as a director and past president of Western Wheat Associates. He has visited the oriental markets where members of the Oregon Wheat Growers and the Wheat League went to show the people how to use wheat flour. It took skillful promotion to develop these markets.

Japan now imports a large amount of wheat and 53 per cent of it is from the United States. He said that about 85 per cent of the wheat yield of the northwestern states has to be exported. About 65 per cent of the total U.S. crop is exported—only a small percentage of the total production is used for human consumption in this country.

Morgan says he enjoys bringing the wheat in Asia story to the public.
