Instructed city attorney Robert Abrams to investigate the possibility of licensing Heppner TV Inc. rather than granting them a franchise. "Licensing is a new approach and the money collected could be placed in the general fund," said Sweeney.

The franchise committee reported they were not in favor of placing a franchise tax on the television company as they were a cooperative. The committee felt this would be another tax imposed upon the people.

Sweeney reminded the council that Columbia Basin Electric Cooperative is also a co-op, yet they pay a franchise tax to the city.

Renewed a contract retaining Robert Abrams as city attorney for an 18 month period. Members of the common council and city employees may ask and receive information pertinent to city business only without any charge to the city. If the city attorney has to research any material for the city he will charge for his time.

Sweeney read Ordinance 394 which will increase the city sewer rates. This was the third reading of the ordinance and the council approved the ordinance.

Harve Haskell, swimming pool manager, notified the city that he has completed his college finals earlier than anticipated. He could open the swimming pool June 10. After listening to a report by Ralph


Marlatt, stating the pool had to be drained and guide lines painted for the swim team, the council voted against the earlier opening. The swimming pool will open Sunday June 15 with free swimming. The pool will be closed the following Monday and re-open Tuesday June 17 for the season.

Randy Lott asked the council if they felt morally right in rescinding a resolution whereby the city would install water mains in subdivisions? He maintained that he had a previous agreement with the city to install water mains in his addition. According to reports the city had installed water mains in his addition and recently rescinded the resolution that obligated the city. After much discussion the council asked the opinion of the city attorney

on this matter. Abrams notified the council that if they had rescinded the resolution, the city is not bound to install his water mains.

Abrams was not present at the council meeting when the resolution was rescinded by a five to one vote of the council. Abrams also stated, "The present council is not bound by any action or previous commitments made by a previous council."

Chief of Police Dean Gilman reported his officers had spent 160 hours of department training. They have issued citations to three minors in possession of intoxicating beverages; had handled two attempts to elude the police; had conducted various checks on elderly people. Gilman also reported he had collected \$283.04 in parking meter money for the month of May.
