Barbara Sherman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Sherman, Heppner, Oregon, became the bride of Gary Watkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. R.G. Watkins, Heppner, on May 3, 1975, at 2 p.m. The ceremony was read by The Rev. Melvin Dixon and The Rev. Edwin Cutting at the United Methodist Church in Heppner.

The church was decorated with flowers in the bride's colors of peach, orange and white.

The bride, in marriage by her father, Calvin Sherman, wore a formal length gown styled in an empire modified A-line silhouette with fullness of the skirt controlled to a full attached chapel length train. A ruffled flounce encircled the skirt and train. The gown was fashioned of sheer crystal organza and imported Brussels embroidered lace over English net, and featured a high Victorian neckline of scalloped lace circled with tiny Venice edging above a sheer embroidered lace horse-shoe shaped bib insert in the cameo motif sculptured with pearl embroidery and sequins. Best man was Dean Wright, Heppner. Ushers were Ron Sherman, brother of the bride, Mike Doherty and Dallas Harsin, all of Heppner, and Mark Hopkins of Pendleton.

For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Sherman chose to wear a floor-length yellow gown with long-sleeved jacket of matching lace. Mrs. Watkins, the groom's mother, wore a floor-length pink gown with tulip sleeves.

The wedding reception was held in the basement of the United Methodist Church.

Museum given unusual gifts

Several exhibits have been added to the County Museum since Memorial Day. The family of Alex and Mattie Green presented a large, cast-iron lard rendering kettle.

Herman Green says their parents moved it from ranch to ranch with them, and he recalls standing stirring lard in it by the hour over an open fire. He says it had to be stirred vigorously to keep it from scorching and turning brown. Often the Green family shared the kettle with ranch neighbors when they had joint butchering sessions. The big kettle is now in place in the north-east corner of the new section of the museum.

Mr. and Mrs. C.H. Brandhagen brought in two unusual pictures taken in 1903 during the cleanup after the Heppner Flood. The pictures show the Sumpter and Baker City Relief Corp. removing bodies from piles of debris.

Mr. and Mrs. M.V. Nolan contributed an old "Test Your Own Eyes" kit. It gives instructions for selecting glasses and has a collection of quaint-looking eye-glasses for trying on.

Mr. and Mrs. J.D. Conway (Josephine Woodrey) of King City made a visit to the museum, last week and presented some copies of rare papers. Included are a May 1906 "Ione Proclaimer" and quite a few newsclippings and pictures.

The old newsclippings and pictures are mostly about Audrey Woodrey and her trip east with 16 other Oregon girls. The girls won the trip by selling subscriptions to "The Pacific Northwest," an early Portland periodical.

Audrey, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.A. Woodrey, Ione, was the leading saleslady and has won the privilege of electing the group chapter. She chose Mrs. C.E. Gelfand, the wife of the publisher of the Heppner paper, Philip Bates, the Portland publisher, also represented the ladies to Chicago, New York City and Washington, D.C. when they were entertained by President Franklin Roosevelt.

Mrs. Harnett is headquarter of the museum's open house, including Times, Heppner, Oregon, local people and out of town visitors. Sheppner, W. East, took some time to read and read on "Ione's" game, from a museum which cannot and cannot be recalled.

Virginia Whitaker purchased Miladies Apparel Shop, and has since changed the name to the Lebus Shoppe. She said, "I don't feel that I have a new business, as I have been operating the store for over a year."

At present the Lebus Shoppe is undergoing remodeling to the exterior of the shop. When completed the front of the store will be trimmed with brick and wood shingles. Some of the interior remodeling has been completed, although she said, "There is still a lot of work to be done on the inside."

She has added many new lines of fashions in an attempt to bring a larger selection of women's wear to the community. She has tried to encourage people to shop in Heppner first.

Mr. and Mrs. Don Cole recently purchased Elma's Apparel and Flower Shop. Don Cole said, "We had a family contest to determine new names for the stores and finally came up with Cole's House of Fashions and the Flax Patch."

They plan to phase out mens wear and carry a more complete line of children's clothing.

The Cole's also purchased the former Knox building. "I have always complained of it being an eyesore to the community and now that I have purchased the property I plan on making some changes within the near future," said Cole.

The addition of some dirt fill planting flowers and the addition of a few picnic tables would completely change the appearance of the present lot. This change would afford the people of the community a place to either visit or eat their lunches," said Cole.

A grand opening is planned sometime in August for the new stores," he remarked.

Forrest Burkenbine and Ernie McCabe, new owners of Central Market, told members of their plans in their new venture.

Burkenbine said, "We are not planning any major changes, only some minor ones for the benefit of our customers." Some of the changes include plans to place grocery items on a computer basis. on to the customer," said Burkenbine, "however, we plan to continue the discount prices to our customers and also give them the green stamps again."

McCabe told the members, "We are new owners with old faces, but we hope we can be an asset to the community."

Leroy Gardner announced his newly renovated store plans to have its grand opening toward the end of June.

Peterson told the new business owners the Merchants Association meets the first Friday of each month and asked them to take an active part in the activities.

He also stated, "The Heppner merchants have selected July 11-12 for their Sidewalk Bazaar and asked the new merchants to continue their participation in the program."

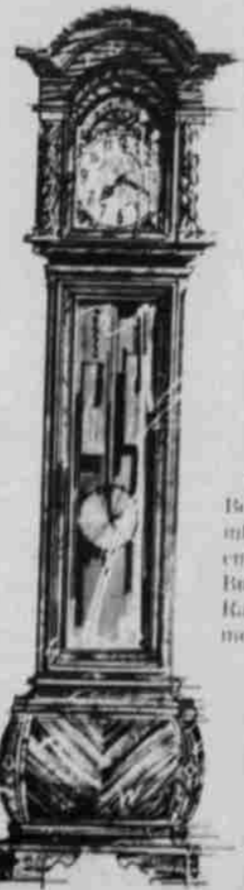
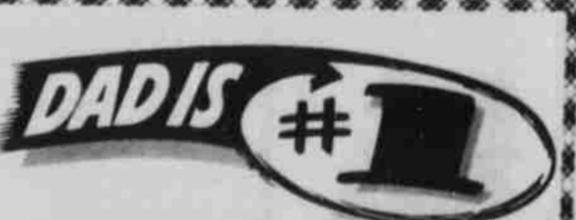
