Sponsored by the vestry and congregation, and with the Bishop of Eastern Oregon, The Rt. Rev. Wm. B. Spofford, present, Fr. Blackaller was thanked for his three years of service to the congregation and the mission of Morrow County and received a "Treasure Chest" of gifts and greetings.

He will officiate at services for the last time on June 29, 1975, and then will retire to the vicarage of Nelson, British Columbia. He will assist the Bishop and Dean of the diocese of Kootenay in the Anglican Church of Canada in a spoked field of Cathedral and subsidiary mission congregations.

Fr. Blackaller moved to Heppner in 1972 from the positions of canon of St. Michael's Cathedral, Boise, Idaho, and chaplain of St. Luke's Hospital, Boise.
