32 trailers of the Oregon unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club parked overnight at Irrigon in the park area along the railroad on North Main Ave. They made the drive from Portland Sunday, where an 8 day rally of the Oregon unit was held on Multnomah Co. Exposition grounds. They received a rousing sendoff by the Queen of the Rose Festival and her court.

Leading this particular Caravan is Walt Thompson, president of the Oregon unit, who expressed appreciation for the camp area to Mayor Chester Wilson, who welcomed the group.

The Caravan is enroute to the 18th International rally in Brandon Manitoba, Canada, beginning July 25. 5,000 trailers are registered to attend this annual event at Brandon, 100 miles west of Winnipeg. This is the first rally to be held in Canada. Last year's meeting was held in Notre Dame where just over 4,000 attended.

The Wally Byam Caravan Club is a loosely organized group interested in group travel. The one essential requirement of membership is to own an Airstream trailer. A large percentage of the membership are senior citizens.

The Good News Singers and pianist, John Marlow, presented a program of gospel music at the Assembly of God in Irrigon, Sunday night.
