Court house notes

The Morrow County Court has officially appointed Pat Majeske Wright as successor to the late Tiny Sweeney as Morrow County Health Nurse. Mrs. Wright has been working in this capacity during part of Mrs. Sweeney's illness. Pat, an R.N. grew up near Lexington and now lives there with her children. It is possible that if an application which has been submitted to the Maternal and Health Section of the State Health Division is approved, that funding will be available to change Mrs. Wright from three-fifths time to full time work.

Last Friday Judge Jones attended a meeting of the East-Central Oregon District No. 12, Association of Counties.

Last week, Tuesday, the final budget hearing saw five persons appear on behalf of the Heppner Child Care Center to plead for financial assistance. After discussion a special allowance of \$250 was granted for the improvement of the center. It is understood that this amount was to come from the 1974-75 budget and not from the 1975-76 budget.

At the regular meeting of the court last Wednesday the proposed budget for the coming fiscal year was formally adopted. The new budget provides \$403,367 for the general fund and road department, plus \$56,563 to assist in the operation of the Pioneer Memorial Hospital. The total adopted budget for

all county agencies and public facilities is \$1,630,627 of which \$476,546 will be tax money paid by the citizens.

County Juvenile Director Carolyn Davis, took a 15-year-old boy from the county to the foster home at Meacham last week. This brings the number of juveniles there from this county to four. The charge to the county for the care of these children was recently increased.

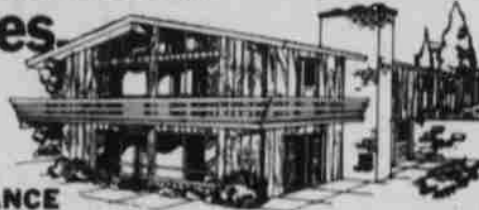
