# School board accepts recommendations

Morrow County School District directors met at 9 p.m., Monday, July 7, to discuss critical issues related to building needs in Morrow County. All members of the seven-member board were present.

After lengthy discussion, the board accepted the recommendations of the district's long range planning committee which calls for construction of new facilities to be completed by the fall of 1976. This would require a bond issue early this fall.

The board motion calls for construction of a new shop facility at Heppner High School, some remodeling of the old Heppner Junior High building and improvement of the playground at Heppner Elementary School.

At Ione, the plan calls for construction of a new shop area and the remodeling of the present shop for band and music use. The plans call for construction of a six room addition to the A.C. Houghton Elementary School in Irrigon and the expansion of the

existing library there. Also included was the construction of a four classroom addition to Riverside High School and additional seating for the Riverside High gym.

The board also agreed to ask the long range planning committee to continue to explore the district needs. The school population is expected to nearly double by the fall of 1977, creating additional building needs.

In other action, the board agreed to accept the firm of Smith and Hasagawa of Ontario as architects for a 3-year term.

Superintendent Matt Doherty reported to the board that if the projected enrollments occur as anticipated, present land is not sufficient to meet the state standards required for the classrooms which may be needed.

The superintendent was instructed to review the potential school sites in the Boardman-Irrigon area and present these to the board for future discussion.

# Fraud being reduced in unemployment claims

The Oregon Employment Division reported that fraud control activity in the second quarter of 1975 (April-June), through its Unemployment Insurance Benefits section, brought recommendations for prosecution of 17 new cases, bringing the total number of cases during the quarter to 58.

The Division reported that even though the number of Unemployment Insurance claims processed were at record levels, fraud was kept to a minimum through the constant vigilance of claims personnel, tax auditors, fraud investigators, and the cross-matching of claims through the division's computer.

A total of 17 cases were completed during the quarter leaving 41 cases pending. The completed cases brought seven convictions and five dis-

missals in Multnomah county; two convictions each in Linn and Marion counties, and one conviction in Baker county.

The courts ordered restitution of monies in ten cases; suspended sentences in 11 cases; imposed a sentence of 40 hours of volunteer community service within the next six months in one case; imposed fines in four cases, ranging from \$5 to \$505, and set probationary periods in ten cases ranging from three months to five years.

A total of 191 determinations were written in which 3,128 calendar weeks of U.I. benefits were disqualified for willful false statements or misrepresentation. A total of \$130,024.70 was recovered in overpayments of U.I. benefits during the quarter, the Employment Division reported.

## Game regulations at license dealers

The game mammal regulations synopsis was received ahead of schedule this year from the printer and has been mailed to license agents throughout the state, according to Department of Fish and Wildlife staff biologists, Don Will.

The booklets are free of charge and all hunters are urged to pick up a copy. This will be especially important this year since a number of changes in regulations have been made. Hunters who wish to apply for any of the permit or controlled season hunts offered in 1975 should get a copy since application deadlines are approaching.

This year there will be no management unit deer permits or "unit doe" permits for either mule or blacktail deer. Nevertheless, there are a number of special agricultural permit hunts both and after the general deer seasons. Before applying for any permit hunt, hunters are urged to consult the regulations booklet and then be sure to list the hunt by the specific name listed in the new regulations booklet.

If applications are filled out incorrectly or for a hunt that was not authorized for 1975, they will be returned to the sender (a costly and time-consuming process for the Department). If they are received too near the application deadline for return, they simply will not be considered in the public drawing.

The application deadline for sheep tags or August deer and elk permit hunts is coming up soon. Hunters must have their applications in at the former Wildlife Commission's Portland headquarters by 5 p.m. on July 15 for these hunts. The deadline for all other deer permits is August 3 and for all other elk permit hunts and cougar tags is August 19.

The license agent will also have Oregon Game Management Unit maps which are dated July 1, 1973 on the front. These maps are still valid for 1975 since no boundary changes in management units have been made. Complete application instructions for special permits and controlled season tags are given on pages 32-33 of the new regulations booklets.

## Unemployment down here

Unemployment dropped in May for both Morrow and Umatilla Counties, following the trends set in April.

Although Morrow County showed a slight drop (-50) in its nonagricultural labor force over the month to 1,680 in May, the difference was absorbed by the seasonal upsurge in the agricultural segment, mainly without irrigation, grain preharvest, and potato preharvest activities. Approximately 110 seasonal agricultural workers were added to the Morrow County labor force in May. The only nonagricultural area to show an increase was transportation and utilities (+10), a seasonal addition. Contract

construction and lumber and wood products both showed the greatest decline (-30).

Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill released their projections of population in Gilliam, Morrow and Umatilla Counties on June 3, 1975. In that study, commissioned by Portland General Electric, a population gain of 16,400 persons was expected by 1977 (3,740 of whom would be construction workers) due only to the proposed construction at PGE's Pebble Springs and Carty sites and the Alumax site. Other population gains should occur due to the expanding agri-business in the area.
