

Booths available at county fair

There are four community booth spaces still available for clubs to prepare displays at the fair.

Community booth competition is open to all organizations in Morrow County, including school clubs, which are non-profit.

Each group putting in a display is paid \$10 to help defray its cost. The booths are then placed in one of four categories, youth, farm, community service and social and church. A first, second and third prize winner is selected in each category.

The booth display must follow the fair theme "Bicentennial." The theme may be employed to tell a story of the community or the work the organization is doing. The booths measure approximately four feet deep and six feet across the front. The score card used for judging the

booth is listed in page 7 of the Morrow County Fair Premium Book.

The organizations entering the competition to date are Morrow County CowBelles, Boy Scouts, Heppner American Legion Auxiliary, Merry Mixers 4-H Club of Ione, Heppner Child Development Center, Heppner Branch AAUW, Ione Garden Club, Heppner Garden Club, Heppner Lions, Lois Winchester, Alpha Theta, Morrow County Bicentennial Committee, Seventh-day Adventist Church and the Right to Bear Arms Organization. The Morrow County Chamber of Commerce is entering a special display which it will later take to the Oregon State Fair as Morrow County's entry.

day, July 24 and 25, and on any date after Aug. 4 up to Aug. 18. Booth reservations will be accepted on a first come, first serve basis until all booths are reserved.

First aid deadline

If you are a rancher or farmer and employ two or more persons, then you are required by law to have a first aid trained person on your ranch, says Mike Howell, Morrow County Extension Agent.

The deadline date for this ruling was June 1, 1975.

Several employers have expressed concern that they will be cited by OSHA officers for violation of the June 1 requirement since they have people in training or signed up for training but not yet qualified.

Health Section and Division spokesmen say that employers who have people signed up for, or actually in training at the time of a compliance inspection, will be considered to be making a satisfactory effort towards meeting the requirements itself and will not be cited for failing to meet the June 1 deadline.

Persons needing to take the required first aid course may sign up for one by calling the extension office.
