1.D. On June 19, 1975, the Board of Directors of the System adopted Resolution No. 733 providing for a plan and system for the acquisition and construction by the System of two nuclear generating plants to be known as its Nuclear Project No. 4 and Nuclear Project No. 5.

2. The projects which are the subject of the above actions and the property pertaining to said actions are as follows:

2.A. The System's Nuclear Project No. 4 is a nuclear fueled electric generating unit consisting of a nuclear steam supply system manufactured by Babcock & Wilcox Company which supplies steam to a Westinghouse Electric Company turbine-generator designed to produce approximately 1,250,000 kilowatts of electric energy, and the related cooling facilities and other auxiliary equipment, structures and buildings. The unit is currently scheduled to begin commercial operation in March 1982.

The Project location is in Benton County, Washington, and is located approximately 15 miles north of Richland on a portion of the United States Energy Resources Development Agency Reservation.

2.B. The System's Nuclear Project No. 5 is a nuclear fueled electric generating unit consisting of a nuclear steam supply system manufactured by Combustion Engineering, Inc., which supplies steam to a Westinghouse Electric Company turbine-generator, designed to produce approximately 1,240,000 kilowatts of electric energy and the related cooling facilities and other auxiliary equipment, structures and buildings. The unit is currently scheduled to begin commercial operation in March 1983.

The Project location is in Grays Harbor County, Washington, and is located approximately three miles south of the town of Satsop.

2.C. The Puget Sound Power & Light Company's Skagit Project is described as two nuclear fueled electric generating units each of which will include a nuclear steam supply system manufactured by General Electric Company, a Westinghouse Electric Company turbine-generator, designed to produce approximately 1,270,000 kilowatts of electric energy and the related cooling facilities and other auxiliary equipment, structures and buildings. The units are currently scheduled to begin commercial operation in July 1982 and July 1983, respectively.

The Project location is in Skagit County, Washington, and is located approximately 12 miles northeast of the City of Mount Vernon.

2.D. The electric power service areas and property therein, which may or may not be affected by the above actions, include the service areas of the above listed public utility districts, people's utility districts, irrigation district, cities, towns and electric cooperatives.

3. The electric power produced by the above-mentioned Projects is expected to be distributed to the preference and other customers of Bonneville throughout the Pacific Northwest Region by Bonneville and to the investor owned utilities by Bonneville or their own systems.

1. The System's actions authorized by Resolutions Nos. 732 and 733 referred to above are subsequent to its action authorized by its Board of Directors Resolution No. 719 adopted October 25, 1971, and the System reserves its rights under the notice of said Resolution No. 719 published and filed as authorized by RCW Section 43.21C.080.

Summer Free legal help

Sumner spoke on HB 2629, legislation that did pass and would permit areas that become "impacted" due to major construction to have tax relief for schools and other public services.

The law provides that when construction, particularly in the north part of Morrow County, works a financial hardship on the county the builders or contractors may be allowed to prepay taxes to relieve the taxpayers. The pre-paid taxes are to be refunded over a 10-year period with interest.

It is a program, Sumner said, in which both Alumax and Portland General Electric are willing to participate.

Medical malpractice insurance drew a lot of interest in the past session, Sumner said. As a result, there is now a \$500,000 limit on the malpractice suits to be filed in the state. Dr. Wallace H. Wolff said following the Sumner speech that the legislation will also result in the medical profession doing a better job of screening and policing physicians who are found to have a pattern of malpractice complaints.

Sumner said there will be an increase of one cent per gallon in the state gasoline tax beginning in October. The added revenue is earmarked for maintenance and reconstruction of existing highways only.

"In some sections of Eastern Oregon," Sumner said, "from 85 to 90 per cent of the people were opposed to the tax increase—but all of them wanted to maintain the highways. A matter of wanting the work done but being unwilling to pay for it."

On June 14 Sumner was named to the Legislative Emergency Board, initiated to effect transfers of money within state agencies. It is his assignment during the time the legislature is out of session.

Sumner represents the 35th Legislative District, one of the largest in the state, geographically. It extends from Irrigon to Salem.

He was accompanied to the meeting by Mrs. Sumner, who will be invited to speak to the group at a later date regarding her duties as an employee of the senate.

The Sumners are now residing on their Morrow County ranch.

Avon Melby, program chairman, announced that the next chamber speaker will be Nese Kizilkoy, a 4-H Youth Exchange Program student who is spending two weeks as a guest of the Harold Baker family at Boardman. Miss Kizilkoy is said to be proficient in speaking English and German in addition to her native tongue.

The Sixth Judicial District Legal Aid Society now operates a full-time Legal Aid Center in Pendleton to serve low-income persons in Umatilla and Morrow counties.

The center located at 146 South Main, Room 204, is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Appointments can be made in Pendleton by calling 276-6685.

On the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month an attorney from the center is in Heppner from 1 to 5 p.m.

Appointments in Heppner are arranged through Pat Brindle at the Neighborhood Center, phone 676-5893.

The Bank of Eastern Oregon is donating office space for client interviews.

The service is funded by local filing fees and federal grants through the Blue Mountain Economic Development Council. The area has two attorneys, Robert Beltramo and Richard Faus. The program has been in operation since June 1.

The legal services are for single persons who earn no more than \$250 per month. Others whose income is no more than the basic \$250 plus \$60 for each dependent are eligible. The only cost, in most cases, is only the \$5 filing fee, which is waived in hardship cases.

The legal center does not handle criminal cases nor civil actions where money recovery is involved. The bulk of its cases deals with domestic problems, child custody, divorce, landlord-tenant relations and consumerism.
