AAUW outlines year's programs

The Heppner Branch of the Associated University Women is kicking off its drive for new members with a "membership coffee" to be held Monday evening, Sept. 15, at the home of Jeanne Howell, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

"You do not have to be a college graduate to belong to the Heppner branch," states Pat Edmundson, Branch second vice president in charge of membership. "You do not have to be a dedicated women's libber—we are not a women's liberation group. We are a group of homemakers, secretaries, teachers, nurses, etc., who are interested in the community around us."

The purpose of the Heppner Branch of AAUW is to unite women interested in the promotion of practical educational work and to concentrate and increase their effectiveness in the community for the solution of social and civic problems. The local branch participates on the state and national level, study topics and a strong legislative program.

The four national study topics which will be studied for the next two years in AAUW are "World Pluralism—the Human Encounter," "Economic Facts of Life—Living with Less," "The 21st Century—Deciding Now" and "Society and the Individual—Conformity vs. Creativity."

On the legislative scene, AAUW has a strong lobby on both the state and national levels. The Oregon division of AAUW was responsible for the passage of legislation in the 1975 Oregon Legislature which will end the discrimination against women in Oregon's Inheritance Laws.

The program for the coming year in the Heppner Branch was announced at a meeting

held Saturday, Sept. 6. In October the branch will hold a progressive international dinner. During the month of November members will travel to Pendleton to see a play at Blue Mt. Community College. The first Saturday in December is the date for the annual Arts and Crafts sale and show called the Artifacts. January's meeting will be a "Pictorial History of Morrow County." Representatives of social services in Morrow County, in particular the Retired Senior Volunteers Program will speak at the February meeting. March's topic is "Conformity vs. Individuality." April will feature recollections of Morrow County's past by long time residents of the county.

The year closes in May with a potluck and installation of officers.

The branch's special projects are to sponsor a Shakespearean Troop to perform in the Heppner area this fall, a strong emphasis on the Bicentennial through two programs and in addition possibly sponsoring the development and production of an original melodrama about the early history of Morrow County; the Artifacts to be chairmanned by Kathy Anderson and Judy Hinn; a special meeting for the public with our legislators; continued work on the children's room at the library and the summer library story hour.
