Elk and Cougar permits drawn

Successful applicants for some 5,850 antlerless elk permits and 95 cougar tags were selected in a public drawing Friday, Aug. 29 at the Department of Fish and Wildlife's Alder Street office in Portland.

A roomful of sportsmen were on hand to help select the lucky numbers. Success in the drawing is based on the last digit of the application serial number. The ending digit sequence of numbers randomly selected by the public for this drawing was 3, 1, 7, 0, 6, 5, 9, 1, 8, and 4.

Some 42,834 applications were received this year, about 4,300 fewer than last year. The Wenaha Unit, with 150 permits authorized, received 163 priority applications. (Those who

have been unsuccessful in five or more previous drawings may send in their unsuccessful notices to be given a priority status in the drawing.) The 150 permit holders were drawn from among these 163 applicants and the 2,182 nonpriority applicants were not considered in the drawing.

The Bartlett Area near Troy, however, which also had 150 permits authorized, received only 105 total applications with 45 permits remaining to be filled on a first come, first served basis. It is anticipated these permits will be gone very quickly.

Some 840 applications were received for 95 available cougar tags, all restricted to specific areas in northeast Oregon.

Mustangs open football season

Heppner High School opens its Columbia Basin Conference football season, Friday night with a league game at Condon. Game time is 8 p.m.

Heppner, Sherman County and Weston-McEwen are the pre-season favorites to battle for the conference crown. Most league coaches are leaning towards Sherman County. The Huskies demonstrated their power last week by defeating Enterprise, 33-16.

"We will be right in the thick of the race for first place," said head coach Chuck Starr. "We will take one game at a time and not overlook anybody. Pilot Rock could be tough and Riverside will be much improved."

The Mustangs return 14 lettermen from the team that went 8-2 for the season and was 7-0 in conference play. The locals dropped a 19-7 decision to Pine-Apple in the state quarter-final playoffs.

Returning lettermen include seniors Mike Orwick, Wade Padberg, Clayton Wilson and Rob Eckman, all backs, Bill Van Schoiack, Doug Harris, Dale Munkers, Greg Clow, Dan Marshall and Clay West, all linemen. Juniors are David Allstott, quarterback, Carl Christman and Steve McLaughlin, both ends, and Chris Rauch, a lineman.

Highlights of this season's squad are size and depth at the interior line positions and speed and experience at

running backs.

The Mustangs will probably start an offensive line that will average 178 pounds per man and could "beef" it up through substitution. The interior line roster averages 185 pounds per man.

The "big men" include sophomores Bob Smith, 200, and Marty Smith, 202, and juniors Mike Smith, 223, and seniors Clow, 199, David McLachlan, 191, and Van Schoiack, 193.

The back field speed is led by Wilson, a 10.4 sprinter in the 100 yard dash and Padberg, a 50.9 runner in the 440. Both are three-year lettermen.

"We opened practice this fall looking for a quarterback and some linemen," said Starr. "We think we have the holes filled with able players. What we need is to gain experience."

Left-handed junior, David Allstott is handling the quarterbacking duties.

The varsity roster includes several who have gained from junior varsity experience. They include Allen Burkenbine and Jeff Cutsforth, ends, and Tim Daly and John Schiller, both backs. All are juniors. Sophomores include Ray Cate, back, Jerry Cutsforth, end, Ken Grieb, guard, Marty Smith, tackle, Chris Wright, center, and Bruce Young, quarterback.

First-year players on the

squad include senior David McLachlan, end and tackle and juniors Mike Smith, tackle, and Wayne Seitz, back.

The Mustangs are looking for considerable playing time for two transfers, Mark Parker, junior guard, and Bob Smith, sophomore tackle.

Slated for junior varsity action which begins next Monday against Pilot Rock here at 6 p.m. are freshmen backs David Bradley, Eugene Cate, Randy Cole, Lance Jones, Bryce Powell and Dennis Peck. Linemen are Perry Cooper, Scott McEwen, Don Servi, Ron Ward, Wade West, Randy Worden and Scott Groshens.

Sophomores who could make the transition to varsity with experience are Dan Van Schoiack, David Jones, Charles Riddle, Don McEwen, Sam Myers and Jim Kenny.

Student managers for the Mustangs are Rusty Estes and Sweek. David Campbell is

student trainer.

Assisting Starr are Dale Conklin, coaching backs and the defense, and George Koffler, coaching ends and junior varsity.

The addition of a team to the league this year necessitates playing eight conference games this fall with only one non-league contest, that being with Union, Oct. 31 at home.
