BOOK CIRCULATION HOLDING STRONG

The Heppner Public Library, in line with other libraries, is finding that more people are reading more books as the months and years pass.

Last year close to 7 books were checked out during every hour the library was open. The library year began July 1. During July 1 through Sept. 14, this year's circulation is averaging 10.5 books each working hour.

Records show 1,365 books checked out in July, August and the first 14 days of September. Many magazines, paperback books and 264 cataloged books have been added to the library since July 1, according to Mrs. Weatherford, librarian. Library cards have been filled in by 64 persons during that period.

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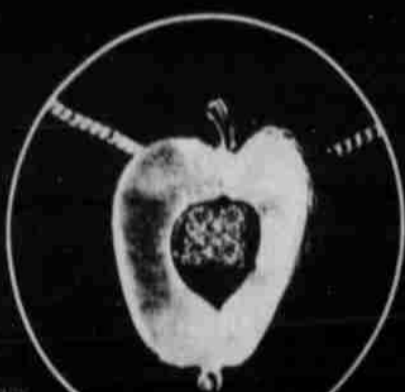
