

Marriage Enrichment, home extension subject

Marcelle Straatman, extension specialist in human development at Oregon State University, will present a series of five lessons in both Umatilla and Morrow Counties on "Marriage Enrichment." The series is intended to help people better understand some of the common concerns in marriage.

This free series will be offered in Pendleton on five consecutive Monday evenings, 7:30 p.m., starting Oct. 6. The same series will be offered in Heppner on five consecutive Wednesday evenings, starting Oct. 15.

Extension Home Economist Molly Saul emphasizes the series concerns marriage enrichment, not marriage counseling. The lessons are based on the premise that if marriage is to be a vital, satisfying, and growth-producing experience, a great deal of energy, knowledge, skill, commitment and time needs to be used to make continuously challenging decisions.

The focus of the series will be marriage expectations.

changing sex roles, love, communication and sharing and caring sexually.

Mrs. Straatman is well qualified to teach the series. She has had a wide variety of experiences in the area of family living and human development. Before coming to OSU she was a member of the home economics-family-consumer studies faculty at Central Washington State College. She has had extensive teaching experience with both young people and adults. She taught in public schools in both Washington and Minnesota, and more recently taught adult night classes at Highline, Skagit Valley and Bellevue Community colleges, Washington. At present she is editing and writing the "Specially for You—The Young Homemaker" monthly newsletter, which is distributed to about 13,000 families throughout Oregon.

BMCC Authorizes Construction

The Blue Mountain Community College Board of Education has authorized surfacing of the college track and construction of three more tennis courts on the campus.

The board approved installation of Marathon rubberized asphalt on the track subject to investigation of the Marathon process by President Ron Daniels. The surface is to be installed by Riverbend Construction Company, Pendleton at a cost of \$32,000.

Also authorized by the board was the addition of three tennis courts at a cost of \$42,850. The original plan called for six tennis courts to be constructed, three of which were authorized last month. McCormack Construction Co., Pendleton, is doing the work.

Another change order was approved that reduced the scope of work on the track, reducing the cost by \$29,616.

Pittock Mansion tour

"One bus load is signed up, and we are well on our way to filling the second!" for the biennial tour of Pittock Mansion, Portland, with a side tour of the nearby Japanese Gardens.

The early fall tour, which was requested last spring is sponsored by the women involved in Extension programs in Morrow County. The tour has attracted a large number of women and men.

Cost per person is \$12.50 which includes transportation and admission to the two sites to be toured. Luncheon and dinner will be paid individual.

According to Birdline Tullis-Morrow, Extension Service, the plans are for a half day tour. "We have the chance of taking one bus of 42 persons which leaves some people car or starting on the second bus. If the second bus is to be chartered we need more interested people to fill the seats." Learn game smoking and drying

Hunters in the area will soon have an opportunity to learn how to smoke and dry their kill. Peter "Gus" Markgraf, extension staff chairman, Baker County, will give demonstrations just prior to the opening of deer season.

He plans to show the techniques of making sausages, lunch meat and jerky from venison or elk. He also will show the procedure for drying and smoking game meats. There will be an opportunity for the audience to help in the preparation of these meats.

Gus is considered to be a real expert on this topic. He has had years of experience and has developed many recipes for use of wild game.

The program is sponsored by the Home Extension Advisory Committees in Umatilla and Morrow counties. All meetings are scheduled in the evening to allow more men to be able to participate.

Floral Class Planned

A one-evening class in basics of floral arranging is planned Saturday, Sept. 27, 8 p.m. at the Seventh-day Adventist Church, 500 Minor. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

Delta Thibet, assisted by Pat Pettyjohn and Helen Martin of the Lone Garden Club will give instruction and demonstrate principles that will help assure a satisfying floral design.

Included in the class instruction will be: How to choose a container and how to collect at low cost a variety of containers for every need. Elements of good design: balance, harmony, contrast, unity, focus, and how to achieve each. Mechanical devices for securing plant material in desired position. Methods of treating flowers and foliage for maximum life and will resistance. How to make a lovely composition with a single flower, mass of flowers or foliage alone. Various forms of arrangements: round, vertical, horizontal, triangular, cross, etc. Suggestions for using native plant materials—wild flowers and dried material. Some display will be some pine warming arrangements.

A large variety of popular foliage and books on arranging.

Those attending are urged to bring a vase or container and holder such as needle holder, ring, chicken wire, straggled foam or Oasis to be used at the practice session, also any flowers, foliage or dried material they may have available to be used in the practice session.

Betty Crocker Contest

College scholarships from \$300 to \$5,000 are available to all high school seniors through the Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living, now under way in its 22nd year.

Invitations to enroll in the program have been mailed to high schools across the nation. Schools new to the program may write the Betty Crocker Search, P.O. Box 1113, Minneapolis, MN, 55440, for information.

Enrollment deadline is Oct. 31, 1975.

On Tuesday, Dec. 2 each participating school will administer a 50-minute written examination. Prepared and scored by Science Research Associates, Inc., Chicago, this general knowledge and aptitude examination is the first important step of the scholarship program.

From the examination results a Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow will be chosen for each participating school. School winners are acknowledged with special awards and their examinations are entered in state competition.

Each State Family Leader of Tomorrow receives a \$1,500 college scholarship, while every state second-place winner receives a \$500 grant. State winners also earn for their school a 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America," from Encyclopedia Britannica Educational Corporation.

State winners, each accompanied by a faculty advisor, will be the guests of General Mills next spring on an expense-paid tour of Washington, DC. A special event of the tour is an announcement of the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, who's scholarship is increased to \$3,000. Second, third and fourth place national winners receive scholarship increases to \$4,000, \$1,000 and \$2,000 respectively.
