Former California Gov. Ronald Reagan will address approximately 400 delegates at a Keynote Luncheon during the 1975 Western States Republican Conference, Friday, Oct. 3, 12:30 p.m., according to Craig Berkman, program chairman.

That evening at 7:30 p.m., Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller will address the delegates at a special convention banquet.

Berkman indicated Vice President Rockefeller and Gov. Reagan are also planning a back-to-back press conference Friday morning. The 3-day conference (Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Oct. 2-4) will be held at the Hilton Hotel, Portland, and

will attract conferees from fifteen western states including Oregon.

have reported the cost per monthly rentals is running \$200-250 per month. On this subject Daniels remarked, "I only hope some contractor will build some student housing in the area."

Asked about the present water leak in the new swimming pool, he replied, "People keep referring to the disappearance of 100,000 gallons of water from the new pool; 100,000 gallons of water doesn't disappear." He continued, "The pool was built on fill and when the water was added to the pool, the pool settled causing cracks in the pool. The water managed to find its way into various trenches and the greater majority of the water found its way to the new track area. Test holes have been made into the pool site to see if any structural damage has been done to the pool, and as far as can be determined, no damage has been done to the pool. The college has not accepted the pool and the responsibility rests with the contractor. It is his obligation to make the necessary repairs to the pool prior to acceptance by the board. This will be done by the contractor with no added cost to the taxpayer," said Daniels. The leaks in the pool will cause some inconvenience to the college, as they will be forced to cancel all classes in swimming instructions for a 30-90 day period or until repairs are completed.

He added, "Most of the construction recommended by the long range planning committee has been completed, and he sees no major construction at BMCC in the future."

Recently the board of directors expressed their opinion and decided to have a meeting of the board in Heppner. The meeting is scheduled for Oct. 15 and will probably be held at Heppner High School.

At present a brief business meeting is planned by the board, allowing board members to answer any questions residents of Morrow County may have regarding Blue Mountain Community College.

Next week's guest speaker at the Chamber of Commerce will be Glen Ward of the Oregon State Wildlife Commission.

Anderson began his journalism career as a sportswriter for the Gazette-Times. He later was managing editor for the summer in 1969.

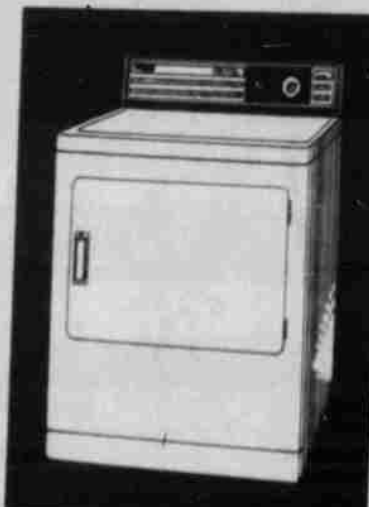
Mr. Anderson, 26, and his wife, Sara, will be buying a home in Walla Walla.



A typical scene along the Oregon coast.

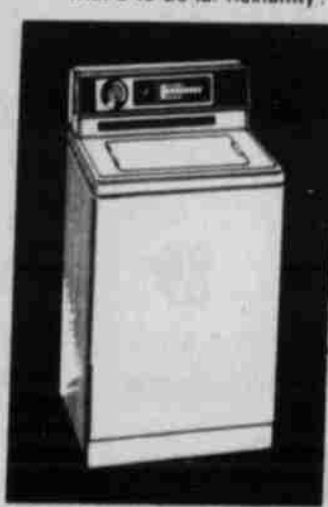
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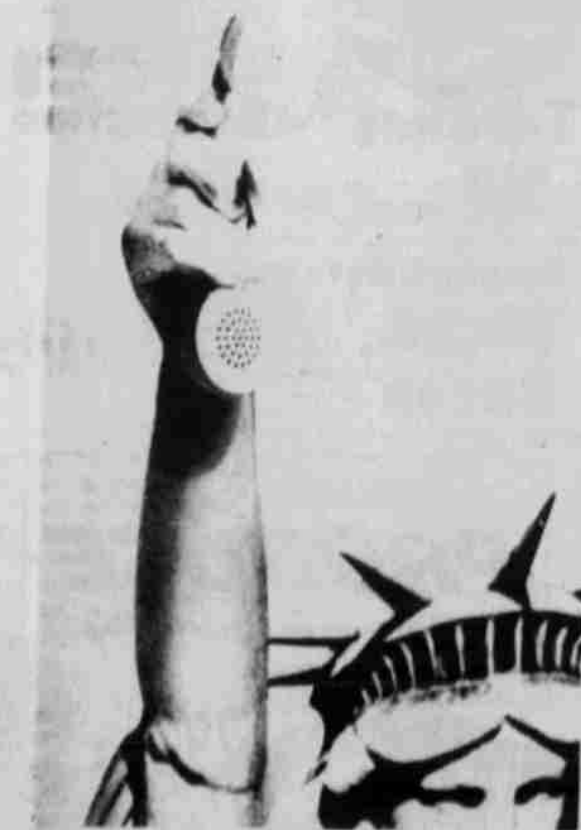
