

Cards Defeat Touchet

The lone Cardinals defeated Touchet, WA, Friday afternoon at Lone by a score of 26-8. An early first quarter drive by the Cardinals gave the Cards their first score, when Joe Rietmann scored from the four yard line. The PAT failed and lone led 6-0, as the half ended.

In the third quarter the Cards scored on a 19 yard run by Thompson, and a one yard plunge by Rietmann into the end zone, added another two points. Later in the same quarter, a 35 yard pass, Rietmann to Thomson, gave the Cards another six points, however, the PAT failed and the Cards led 20-0 into the final period.

In the fourth quarter another pass Rietmann to Thompson good for 19 yards gave the Cardinals another six points. The PAT failed. Late in the game Touchet scored their only TD as Strohmaier scampered 10 yards for a TD. The run for the PAT was good and as the game ended the Cards had defeated Touchet 26-8.

This Friday the Cards open their league play in the Big Sky Conference as they host Echo at Lone. Game time is 2 p.m.

Mustang Jv's Get 2nd Win

The Heppner Mustangs traveled to Echo Monday and defeated the Echo JVs by a score of 12-8.

The Mustangs scored early in the game with a 42 yard pass play Bruce Young to Jerry Cutsforth. Another six points were added to the Mustangs score, later in the game on a two yard run by Jerry Kenny.

Leading the defensive charge for the Mustangs were Lance Jones, Jim Kenney and Ken Grieb. Leading ground gainers were Ray Cate, who carried the ball six times for 38 yards, and Jerry Kenny who had seven carries for 49 yards. Bruce Young completed 4 of 8 passes for 93 yards and had one pass intercepted.

This win puts the Mustang record at 2-0. Their next scheduled game is against Pilot Rock, there. Game time is 6 p.m.

Mustangs blank Rockets 20 to 0

The Heppner Mustangs defeated the Pilot Rock Rockets Friday night at Heppner by a score of 20-0.

In the first quarter, the Mustangs and the Rockets failed to move the ball with any amount of authority. In the second quarter with 8:12 left in the period, a four yard pass from Allstott to Steve McLaughlin gave the Mustangs their first score of the game. Clayton Wilson added the extra point and the Mustangs had a 7-0 lead. Later in the quarter, a 17 yard pass play, Allstott to Carl Christman added another six points to the Mustangs score. The PAT by Wilson failed as the half ended the Mustangs had a 13-0 lead.

The last score for the Mustangs came in the third quarter on a 25 yard pass from Allstott to McLaughlin. Wilson added the extra point and the Mustangs had a healthy 20-0

lead going into the final quarter of play.

Statistics for the game are as follows: first downs, (H) 13, (PR) 5; net yards rushing, (H) 148, (PR) 30; net yards passing, (H) 121, (PR) 46; fumbles, (H) 3-1, (PR) 4-1; penalties (H) 55, (PR) 35.

Individual Mustang statistics are as follows: Dave Allstott completed 6-17 passes for a total of 121 yards, with no interceptions, Wade Padberg had 12 carries for 95 yards; Mike Orwick had 8 carries for 29 yards, Clayton Wilson carried the ball 12 times for 34 yards, Carl Christman had two receptions for 57 yards, including one touchdown; Steve McLaughlin had 2 receptions for 29 yards and two TDs and Allen Burkenbine had one reception for 23 yards.

This Friday night the Mustangs host Stanfield. Game time is 8 p.m. at the Fairgrounds.

Hunters road closure program

Vehicle registrations will again be in effect in many popular deer and elk hunting areas when the season opens this fall, according to the Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Some 24 areas totaling nearly 950,000 acres in eastern Oregon and five areas involving more than 56,000 acres in western Oregon will be affected by road closures.

In these areas many secondary roads will be closed to travel by motorized vehicle and all off-road vehicle traffic will be prohibited. Primary roads in most instances will remain open and hunters are reminded that these areas are not closed to hunting.

The restrictions will provide more escape avenues for game animals and at the same time afford hunters a chance for a higher quality hunt on foot or horseback without interference of others driving motor vehicles on and off the roads.

Cooperative closures administered by the Department of Fish and Wildlife and the U.S. Forest Service are listed in the Game Mammal Regulations

booklet available free from license agents throughout the state. It is also possible that some of the national forests may be closing some roads outside of the cooperative closure areas.

The road closure program has been overwhelmingly accepted by most hunters because it has helped put the "hunt" back in hunting. In some national forests extensive road networks constructed for timber harvest have proven detrimental to game herds because they make the animals too accessible. The number of roads a deer or elk must cross in some areas to get from summer range to winter range has doubled or even tripled in the last ten years.

One of the most frequent requests from hunters at public hearings, in letters, and at sportsmen's meetings has been for more road closures. The closures are not effective, however, unless they can be enforced. The Department has been expanding the program as rapidly as enforcement will allow.

Mule deer season

Hunters who plan to participate in the seven-day eastern Oregon mule deer season are reminded by the Department of Fish and Wildlife that several regulation changes will be in effect this year.

Except in three management units, only buck deer with at least one forked antler will be legal game. In previous years a buck needed only a "spike" antler to be legal.

In the Whitehorse, Beatys Butte, and Steens units only 4-point bucks and better will be legal. This means the buck must have at least four points on one antler, NOT COUNTING the brow tine. The brow tine is the tiny projection near the base of the antler which seldom exceeds an inch in length.

The Fish and Wildlife Commission combined this year's shorter than usual mule deer season with more restrictive antler regulations because poor lawn survival and high winter losses in recent years have caused a reduction in mule deer numbers in most eastern Oregon areas.

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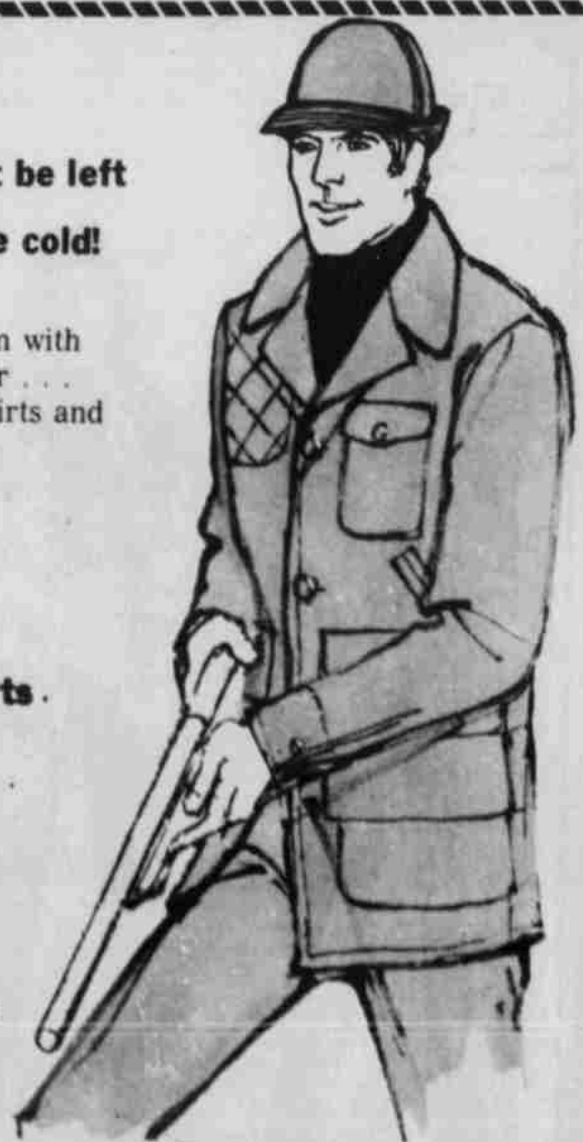
