New phone costs in effect

Pacific Northwest Bell will start charging for Directory Assistance on Oct. 8, under a plan recently approved by the Oregon Public Utility Commissioner.

Customers who have a handicap or disability which makes it impossible to use the directory may be exempt from the charge.

To qualify for the exemption, customers must obtain an application form, available from any PNB business office upon request. The applicant must state on the form the reason for seeking exemption and return the form to PNB.

The PUC has also authorized exemption for customers calling from hotel, motel and hospital rooms as well as coin phones.

All other customers will be allowed five requests per

month to Directory Assistance. The sixth and subsequent requests during the month will be charged 20 cents. All local and intrastate calls (1-555-1212) are subject to the charge.

All calls to Directory Assistance will be billed automatically, with the exception of the Portland metropolitan area, the Baker area and some southern Oregon communities. Any charges will appear with the toll statement on the customer's next telephone bill.

Further information on the Directory Assistance charge plan and dialing instructions are included with telephone bills sent to all PNB customers in September.

Wool contest

Winner of the national contest will receive a 15-day trip to London and Paris.

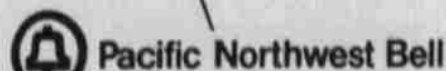
