

P I Horse show to pay \$30,000

More than 600 horse owners will begin gathering in Portland next week in hopes of winning part of the \$30,000 to be awarded as prize money during the 1975 Pacific International Livestock Exposition horse show.

The eleven-performance combination rodeo-horse show begins with matinee and evening performances Oct. 11-12. Evening performances continue through the week. A matinee and evening performance finish the 8th and final day of the P-I, Oct. 18.

"This year's show will have some of the finest horses in the country," says Dr. William Anderson, horse show general manager. "Three world championship five-gaited horses are scheduled to be here and all together we'll have between \$10 and \$12 million worth of horses competing."

Feature attraction of the horse show will be the Arena Kachinas, a trick riding act that includes a comedy ride and a Roman riding demonstration. Also appearing at the show will be the Potter distillery wagon, drawn by 8 Clydesdales.

Tickets to the rodeo-horse show are \$3.50, \$4.50 or \$5 and include admission to the exhibits. Tickets are on sale at the Multnomah County Exposition Center; Steven & Sons Jewelers in the Lloyd Center and Salem; Lipman's Downtown, Washington Square and Eastport Plaza, Salem.
