## GARDEN CLUB GIVES AAUW meets and plans activities

### HELPFUL TIPS

"Houseplants—How to Select them; How to Display them; and How to grow them" was the topic of discussion by Mrs. C.C. Jones at the October meeting of the lone Garden Club.

The group met at the home of Mrs. H.S. Huber with Mrs. Norman Nelson assisting. Mrs. Robert Davis, Milton-Freewater, was a guest for the day. Mrs. George Miller was welcomed as a new member. Mrs. Jones reported for the area beautification committee and reported that plans are progressing for a park in Lexington.

Mrs. Pettyjohn reported corsages had been made for the lone Teachers' Welcome. Twelve members signed up to attend the meeting of the Blue Mountain District No. 10, Pendleton, Oct. 15.

"To be successful at indoor gardening one must understand the plant and its needs for adequate light, correct temperature, proper humidity and nutrients," stated Mrs. Jones. One must remember the majority of plants now grown in our homes originated

in jungle-like conditions so we must provide them a habitat as near natural as possible. Misting with a fine spray may be done in the morning but it does not take the place of regular watering.

Fertilization should be done a few days after watering or it will act as a concentrated dose. Foliage plants can be used in most areas and with any decor. Leaf form and plant habit can be used with imagination.

Feather palms and ferns will lighten massive solid color settings while the large-leaf philodendrons can be used to add strong focal points in rooms with continuous color. If the location chosen for your growing plant needs supplemental lighting to be effective, you can provide the needed light with fluorescent tubes.

Remember, most plants must have a period of darkness every day. If your plant is dug and brought in from your garden, be sure to examine it for insects, disease and wash it with a mild soap solution.

When buying plants get them from a reliable dealer. Note that the plant has the proper shape, is free from leaf damage and is the size needed for the place you wish to put it. Plants can be used to decorate every season of the year, so give them good loving care and they will reward you with beauty.

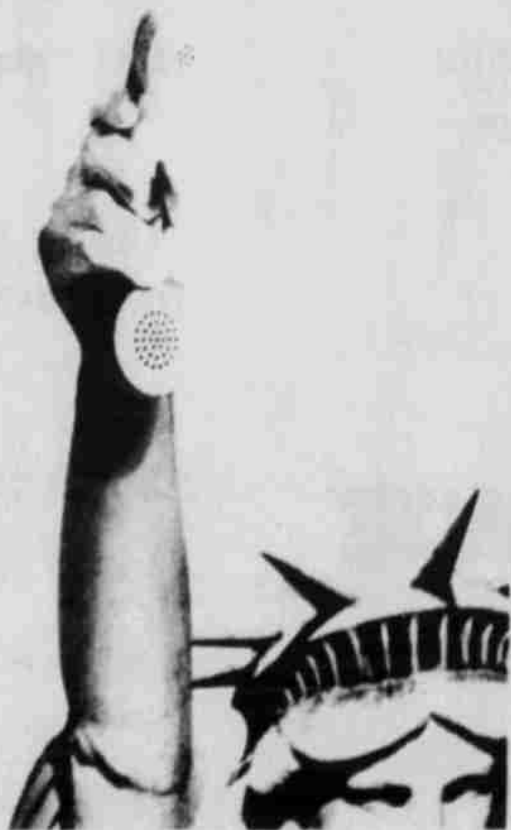
