

Notice of Bond Sale

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned until 10:00 a.m., on the 7th day of November, 1975, and immediately thereafter will be publicly opened by the District School Board of School District No. R-1, Morrow County, Oregon, for the purchase of not less than the par value thereof, and the full amount of the accrued interest thereon, of the following described negotiable general-obligation coupon bonds of such school district, in the principal amount of \$1,100,000.00, dated November 1, 1975, in denominations of \$5,000.00 each and maturing serially in numerical order as follows:

The bonds will bear interest payable semiannually on January 1 and July 1, at such rate or rates in multiples of one-fourth (1/4) or one-tenth of one per cent, not exceeding a net effective rate of 8 per cent per annum, as shall be specified by the successful bidder. The bonds shall have but one coupon for the interest due on any interest payment date. Both the principal of, and the interest on, the bonds will be paid at the office of the County Treasurer of Morrow County, Oregon, at Heppner, Oregon.

The difference between the highest and lowest interest rates bid shall not exceed one and one-half per cent (1 1/2) per annum. The bonds shall be sold to the highest bidder, but the District School Board reserves the right to reject any, or all bids. Unless all bids are rejected, the bonds will be awarded to the bidder complying with the terms of the notice of sale, and submitting the bid which provides the lowest cost to the school district. Each bid must be unconditional, must be accompanied by a certified check or cashier's check in favor of the district, or upon a bank doing business in the State of Oregon in the sum of \$22,000.00, and must be enclosed in a sealed envelope addressed to the undersigned and marked on the outside "Proposal for Bonds." No interest will be allowed on the deposit with the bid, and the check of the successful bidder will be retained as part payment of the bonds or to secure the school district against any loss resulting from failure of the bidder to comply against any loss resulting from failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of its bid.

Each bidder shall include in its bid a statement of the total interest cost to the district, if its bid is accepted. The successful bidder will be furnished, without cost, with the approving opinion of the law firm of Rankin, Walsh, Ragen and Hoberter, to the effect that the bonds are valid and legally binding general obligations of the Morrow County School District No. R-1, and, unless paid from other sources are payable from ad valorem taxes levied upon all of the taxable property within the district without limitation as to rate or amount. The legal opinion of the firm shall be printed on the reverse side of the bonds at the expense of the district. The firm will also furnish a statement in such approving opinion that they have taken into account litigation recently instituted in certain states, including Olsen vs. State of Oregon, challenging the constitutionality of the present system of levying taxes and applying funds for public school purposes, and it does not modify or qualify the conclusions stated in their opinion. The successful bidder will also be furnished with certificates in form satisfactory to the law firm evidencing the proper execution and delivery of the bonds and receipt of payment therefor. The obligations hereunder to deliver or accept the bonds pursuant hereto shall be conditioned on the availability and delivery at the time of delivery of the bonds of the approving opinion, and of a certificate, in form and tenor satisfactory to the law firm and dated as of the date of such delivery, to the effect that there is no litigation pending or threatened, to the knowledge of the signer or signers thereof, relating to the bonds, which certificate will make reference to the litigation referred to above and will state the issuer is not a party to such litigation.

The bonds will be delivered complete, without undue delay, at the expense of the school district, at such city in Oregon as the successful bidder shall name.

Alumni holds reunion

A resolution accepting lands offered for public streets and alleys was adopted by Irrigon's Council, Oct. 14. Some opposition to the city developing them was expressed before they were accepted.

Criticism was registered on an area in Osterkamp's addition that did not have a direct access. Councilman Bill Cooley expressed concern that adequate fire protection could not be given. The Recorder was directed to write Mr. Osterkamp pointing out the problem and asking that a 20 ft. alley be dedicated along the East side of lot 17, connecting S.W. 4th St. with Idaho Ave.

Proposed amendments to the Trailer Ordinance were discussed in view of city attorney Joseph Hershberger's comments. The ordinance which proposes to limit location of mobile homes to 950 sq. ft. of floor space, which is equivalent to a 14' x 70', will come before the council for adoption in the November meeting.

In other business the council voted to add tort and false arrest coverage to its liability insurance. They were informed by Mayor Chester Wilson that 2 lots were being developed that had been subdivided from a larger parcel of land. The lots did not meet the minimum width requirement. Those responsible had been notified to correct the situation before locating a mobile home on the properties.

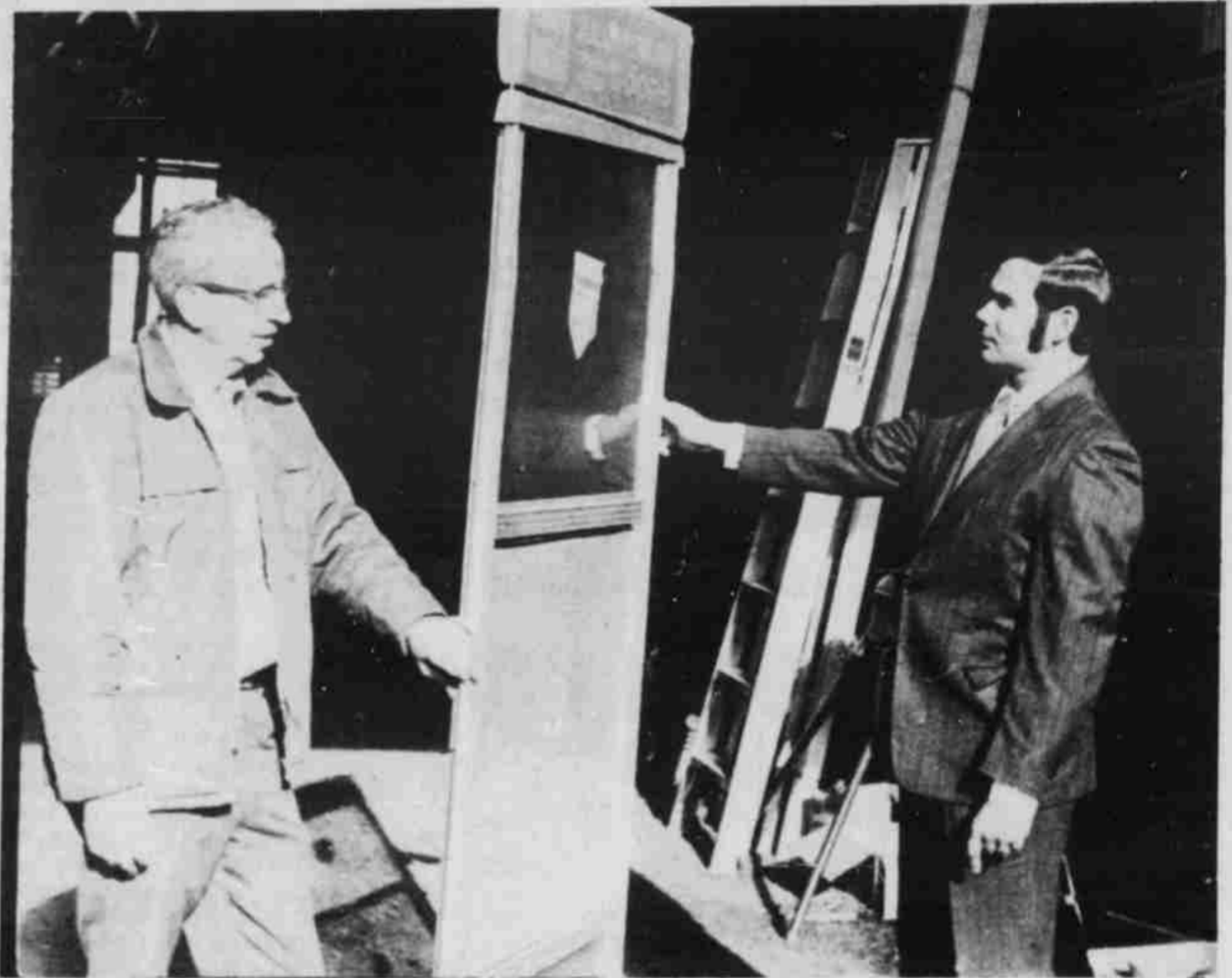
