Oregon's traffic violations increase

Oregon courts reported 577 traffic violation citations to the Motor Vehicles Division during the first 10 months of this year, an increase of 9 1/2 per cent over comparable period a year ago.

Convictions for driving under the influence of alcohol during the period totaled 132, nearly 20 per cent more than for the comparable period last year.

The division report noted it has issued 52,019 mandatory driver license suspensions so far this year,

including those for driving while under the influence of alcohol which, alone, accounted for about 25 per cent of the mandatory license suspensions.

Failure to appear for a court hearing and failure to file or maintain a financial responsibility filing accounted for the bulk of other mandatory license suspensions.

In addition to mandatory suspensions, the division suspended 5,868 licenses under discretionary authority of the driver license law. These suspensions involved an accu-

mulated driving record, failure to pass tests or to appear for tests when requested to do so, physical condition or medical report, court recommendation and failure to pay a fine or comply with a condition imposed by the court.

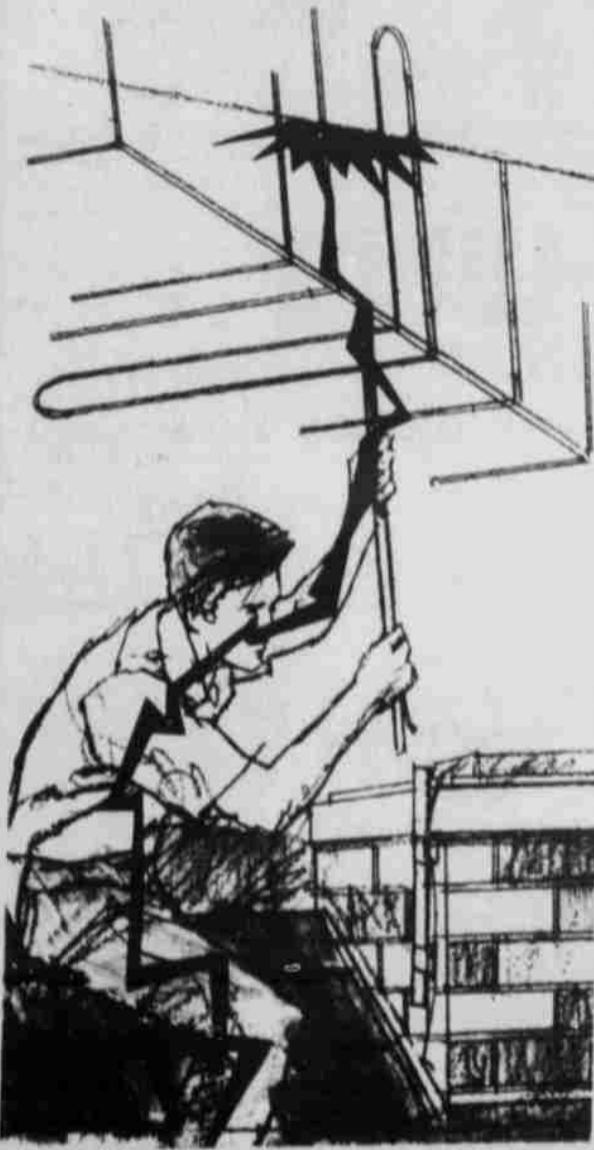
Coast to Coast bowled a high team series with a 2656 and also won the honors for a high team game with a 912.

Meetings are in progress this week and Sunday, Nov. 23, except for Saturday night with the Provincials Trio from Canada. They include J.P. Evans and Mr. and Mrs. D.H. Irvine.

At its November meeting the Irrigon City Council adopted a resolution urging the League of Oregon Cities to work toward establishing the northeastern portion of Oregon as a priority area for state agencies. It is felt that the growth of the area needs special attention in planning, funding and related fields.

Stringent amendments to the city's trailer ordinance were adopted with an emergency clause making it effective immediately. These changes will limit location of mobile homes outside courts or parks to a minimum of 950 square feet placed on property owned by the occupant. The lot size requirement is 9,000 square feet. The renting of mobile homes or lease options will not be permitted. Height of floor above ground level steps and landings and skirting materials were also included in the new regulations. Owners of mobile homes who anticipated locating in Irrigon are cautioned to consider the requirements.

Consideration was given to having the city's ordinances revised, compiled and published by the Bureau of Governmental Research and service in Eugene. However, cost of the project and other relative questions caused the matter to be tabled until more information is received.

A request by James Ebbert, Portland, to lease the city's service building (the old Chevron Station) to conduct a repair service for commercial and industrial motors was presented by Mayor Chester Wilson. The council turned down the offer and voted to have the property appraised to determine the market value. It was felt this would be necessary even though it were leased, since it would need to go on the tax roll again.

The council was informed that Ed Johnson, who had been serving as part time utility man had quit. No replacement was named at the meeting.

Warren Prouty who has been acting as chairman of the Citizens Involvement Committee gave notice meetings had been cancelled until further notice, due to lack of member interest.
