Free diabetic clinics

A series of diabetes detection clinics have been set up by the Morrow County Health Department. Pat Wright, county health nurse would like everyone to make their appointments for the Diabetes Detection Clinic as soon as possible.

Everyone over 18 years of age should have this free, one-minute finger puncture test for diabetes especially if you are: over 40 years of age, a blood relative of a known diabetic, a mother of a 9 pound baby at birth, and over weight.

The clinics will be held at the following locations between the hours of 9-11 a.m. and 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. You must call for an appointment.
