another group of AAUW members and their husbands will see the play at the college. The trip was the November activity for the Heppner Branch.

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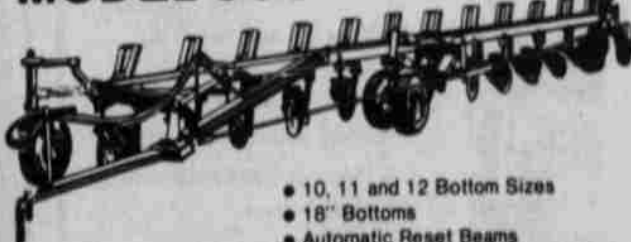
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
