Weston-McEwen and Sherman County, co-champions led balloting for first team selections in the 1975 edition of the Columbia Basin Conference all-star choices made recently by the league coaches.

The Tiger-Scots earned seven berths on the elite group followed by Sherman County with four. Riverside and Umatilla each had three; Heppner, Pilot Rock and Wasco County collected two, and Condon got one.

There were four repeaters from the 1974 squad. Kit Lane, Sherman County tackle, was the only player on offense to gain first team recognition two consecutive years. There were three on defense making it two straight years. They were Brian Hadley and Jerry Zielinski, both from Riverside, and Wade Padberg, Heppner.

Lane was selection on both offense and defense. Also earning dual selections were Steve Quampts, tackle from Pilot Rock, and Gary Munck, center and middle guard of Weston-McEwen.

Kelly Cahill, senior offensive running back from Weston-McEwen, was the only player unanimously chosen by the coaches to first team.

Seniors dominated selections with only three underclassmen getting nods, two juniors and a sophomore.

Riverside of Boardman led in second team choices with six. Sherman County and Heppner had three each; Weston McEwen, Umatilla, Condon and Stanfield, two, and Pilot Rock and Wasco County, one each.
