The girls junior varsity also won their game as they defeated Umatilla 28-21.

Scoring for the JVs were Maureen Healy 10 points, Jackie Mollahan 8, Cindy Kerr 6 and Diane Holland with 4 points.

Mustangs lose tourney

The Christmas tourney has come and gone and Grant Union of John Day finished in the top spot, followed by Condon, Wallowa and Heppner.

The Heppner Mustangs got off to a good start Friday night against the Condon Blue Devils and had a 7 point lead at the half 29-22.

In the third period the Mustangs scored only 5 points while the Blue Devils scored 16. In the final period the Blue Devils scored 9 points and the Mustangs scored 12. The Mustangs lost to Condon by a score of 47-44.

High point man for the Mustangs was Dave McLachlan with 21. Clay Wilson had 8, Tim Skow 7, Dave Allstott 3, and Clay West 3.

Saturday night the Mustangs met the Wallowa Cougars in the consolation game, and were defeated by a score of 67-63.

The game was close during the first and second periods, and as the half ended the Cougars had a 33-31 lead over the Mustangs.

By the end of the third period the Cougars had increased their lead to 12 points and led the Mustangs 57-45.

With four minutes of playing time left and the Cougars leading 61-55, the Cougars went into a stall. They missed an easy shot at the basket and Heppner took the rebound and added two points to their score. As the Cougars inbounded the ball the Mustangs managed to steal the ball and Wilson added two more points to their score. With 1:18 left in the game the Mustangs trailed by 6 points 57-43. A basket by Dave Allstott, with only 49

seconds left closed the gap to within four points as the Cougars led 63-59.

In the last seconds of the game a foul and a field goal for the Cougars increased their lead to 67 points while the Mustangs added another four points to their score and as the game ended the Cougars had defeated the Mustangs 67-63.

High scorers for the Cougars were Kevin McDaniel with 33 points, Burke Lathrop 14 and Kim Conrad with 10.

Dave Allstott led the Mustangs with 17 points followed by Dave McLachlan 15, Clay Wilson 14, Jim Lankford 8, Rob Eckman 6, and Clay West 3.

The Mustangs scored 30-76 from the field for .395 and 3-10 from the free throw line for .300 per cent. The Cougars scored 23-61 from the field for .377 and 21-37 from the free throw line for .568 per cent.

In the play-off game between Condon and Grant Union, the Prospectors had a hot hand as they jumped off to a 28-7 score at the end of the first quarter and by the half they had increased their lead 63-18. The Blue Devils never came within range of the Prospectors and as the game ended the Prospectors had defeated Condon by a 99-35 score.

Prospector Tim Burke led with 23 points followed by Tom Dieker 19, Mike Surplus 18 and Jim Reeve 10. Mike Campbell scored 10 points for Condon.

Grant Union hit on 43-84 from the field for .512 and 13-22 from the free throw line for .591 per cent. Condon hit on 14-41 from the field for .350 and 7-17 from the free throw line for .312 per cent.

Home Loans

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) provides loans in rural areas to finance the purchase of new or existing homes. Rural areas include open country, towns and cities with populations of 10,000 or less which are rural in character and not closely associated with urban areas.

Home Ownership loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair or rehabilitate rural homes and provide adequate water supply or waste disposal systems. Loans are made to provide adequate housing for the purchaser and may not be used as rental property.

Home loans are offered to low and moderate income families. A family's adjusted income is determined as follows: total gross family income, less 5 per cent, less \$300 per family member under 18 years of age. The balance is the adjusted income. To qualify for a loan applicants also must:

Be without decent, safe, and sanitary housing;

Be unable to obtain a loan from private lenders on terms and conditions that they can be reasonably expected to meet;

Have sufficient income to pay house payments, insurance premiums, taxes, normal home maintenance, other debts and necessary living expenses;

Possess the character, ability and experience to meet loan obligations, and properly maintain the property.

Homes financed must be modest in size, style, cost and design. Normally modest housing can be provided in about 1100 square feet of living area. Size of homes financed will depend upon the needs of the immediate family. Loans may be made up to 100 per cent of the FmHA appraised value for new homes if inspections were made during construction by FmHA, Veterans Administration, or Department of Housing and Urban Development. Existing homes and improvements may be financed with 100 per cent loans. The maximum repayment period is 33 years; current interest rate for home loans is 9 per cent. An interest credit may be granted to eligible low income applicants.

Each person who applies receives equal consideration without regard to race, color, creed, sex or national origin.

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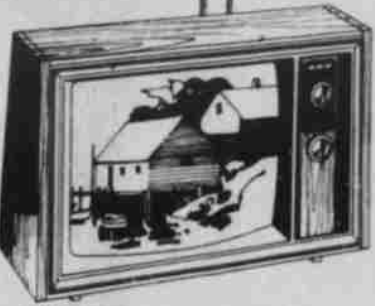
