Mustangs lose opener to Huskies, 59-58

The Heppner Mustangs lost their league opener to the Sherman County Huskies Friday night by a score of 59-58.

It was a see-saw game all the way and was finally decided in the last 29 seconds of play with the score knotted at 58 all. The Huskies had the ball and called time as they drove to increase their lead. As they inbounded the ball Clayton Wilson fouled Dennis McNab. McNab made the first basket from the free throw line and missed the second with the Mustangs getting the rebound.

The Mustangs called time and as they headed for the basket a turnover resulted with the Huskies getting possession of the ball with one second left on the clock. The Huskies inbounded the ball far into their own end of the court as the game ended.

In the first quarter with almost four minutes gone, the score was Sherman 3, Mustangs 2. The game increased in momentum and as the first period ended the Mustangs had a slight lead as they led the Huskies 12-9.

Both teams played good ball during the second quarter and as the half ended the Mustangs had a one point lead over the Huskies, 28-27.

In the third period the Huskies came to life and led the Mustangs by eight points 45-37 as the period ended. In the final period the Mustangs fought back intercepting Huskies passes and making some fine shots of their own, to eventually tie the ball game in the remaining 30 seconds of play.

The Huskies led at the free throw line as they tanked 17-24, while the Mustangs hit on 12-25. The Mustangs had 10 turnovers as compared to 22 for the Huskies.

Dave McLachlan led the Mustangs with 23 points and 15 rebounds. Dennis McNab Sherman, had 25 points and 7 rebounds.

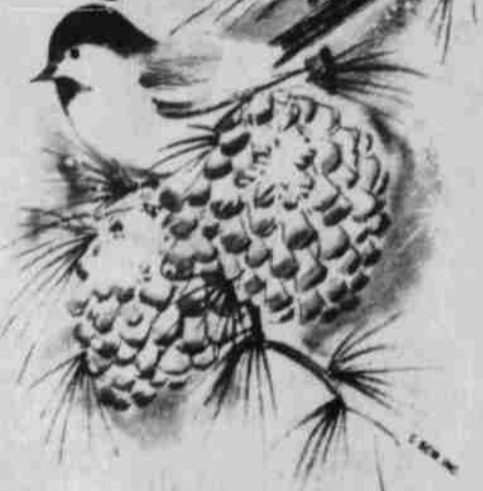

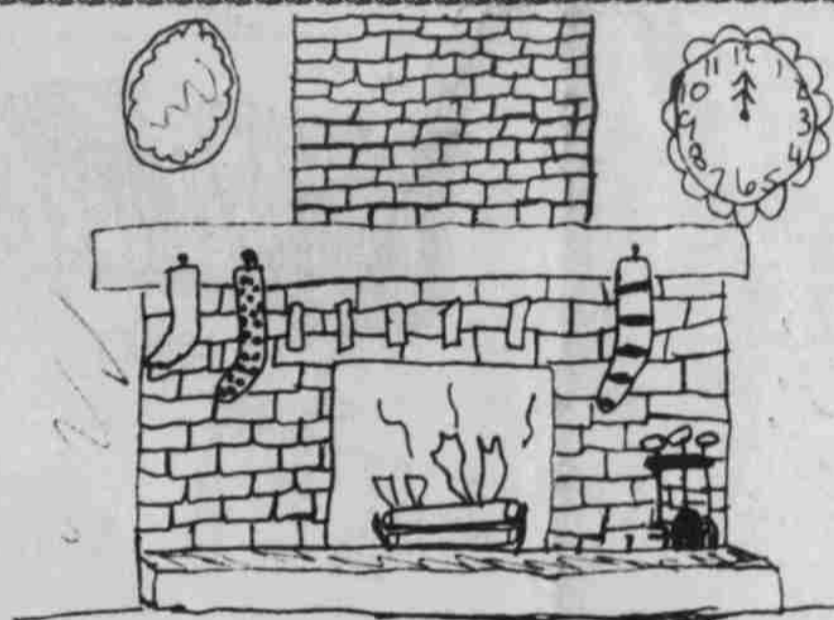

BMCC

Ralph Skoubo, native Boardman farmer, last night was named to the Blue Mountain Community College budget committee.

The college Board of Education appointed Skoubo to fill the position vacated by Fred Nishimura, also of Boardman, who resigned because of business commitments. Skoubo's term runs to July 1, 1976. In other business, the board received a lengthy report detailing the need for an Associate Degree Nursing program at the college, approved in principle plans for a greenhouse on the campus, awarded sabbatical leaves to two faculty members, and offered a three-year contract to President Ron Daniels.

Dr. Gloria Mayer, a consultant hired by the college to survey the 7-county north-eastern Oregon area's needs for Associate Degree Nurses,

said there is a need for the additional nursing program at BMCC. The college now has a 10-month Licensed Practical Nursing program, and nine of the 10 hospitals in the area say the two-year Associate Degree program is needed, she reported.

Minimum faculty needed if such a program were adopted, she said, was three Master's Degree nurses. The board will discuss the proposal Jan. 21.

Plans for construction of a greenhouse on the campus were approved subject to receipt of funds from the National Science Foundation. Exact location of the greenhouse is to be determined later.

Ron Daniels, now in his second year as president of BMCC, was granted a three-year contract. Daniels came to the college from Boardman where he was superintendent of Morrow County schools.
