The distribution of \$27,500 to 18 Oregon counties to cover eligible costs of maintenance and operation of local museums during fiscal year 1975 was announced by Fred B. Klaboe, State Highway Division administrator, recently.

The apportionment is authorized by statute and goes to the various counties as reimbursement for amounts spent in the support of local museums. The amounts ranged from \$229.53 to \$2,352.76.
