QUESTION SUBMITTED TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF SAID DISTRICT

TAX LEVY OUTSIDE THE CONSTITUTIONAL LIMITATION

Proposal: Shall the Board of Education of Blue Mountain Community College District be authorized to levy for the fiscal year 1976-77, beginning July 1, 1976, the sum of \$1,545,259 outside the limitation set forth in Section 11, Article XI, of the Oregon Constitution?

Explanation: The college has no tax base; therefore, any tax to be levied by the board must be approved by the voters. The increase over the preceding year is due to inflationary increases in the cost of all supplies and services used by the college, increases in salaries and payroll taxes, increases in enrollments of 13% since 1974-75, and a large increase in utility costs. Based on the projected True Cash Value of the district for 1975, approval of this general fund levy would result in an approximate cost of \$1.68 per \$1,000 of True Cash Value. This would be an increase of .05¢ per \$1,000 of True Cash Value over the current year's levy. If this measure is approved, the operating budget to be financed by local taxes for the year 1976-77 will be \$147,298 greater than the operating budget financed by local taxes for the preceding year.
