Rules slated

Rules for the Oregon Wheathearts 1976 Cake Baking Contest have been announced.

They are:
Contestant must be a resident of Morrow County.
Cake must be exhibited and judged at Morrow County Fair.
Cake-baking contestants must be women or men over 21, or married women or men; excluding professional bakers.
Each contestant must use the same cake and icing recipe as shown in the premium book. Cakes to be displayed at Wheat League Baking Contest, on board (may be cardboard or board covered with foil, etc.).

Premiums will be paid directly to the winners from the Wheat League office. County premiums are: 1st—\$5.00; 2nd—\$3.00; 3rd—\$2.00.

First place winner will be eligible to enter state bake-off at the Annual Convention of the Oregon Wheat Growers League in December.

Top award of \$100 will be paid to the State Winner. If the county winner is unable to compete, the second place winner may represent the county at the State Convention.

Cake-baking contestants may not re-bake their cakes at State Bake-off unless there is a mechanical failure.

Besides the top award of \$100 to the winner, they will also be presented with a trophy at the annual banquet.

Check your county premium book for time your entry should be in place.
