

Farmers warned to separate grain

Director of Agriculture Leonard Kunzman this week warned farmers in Oregon to take great care in keeping good grain separated from grain that may have been damaged by rain.

Kunzman said, "Right now it appears we have enough top quality wheat to supply our traditional cash markets. Most of this wheat was harvested before our heavy rains. However, some areas, particularly the Willamette Valley, are experiencing varying degrees of grain sprouting. If this sprouted grain is stored with top quality grain the effect is a general deterioration of wheat grades and a reduction in cash value."

Kunzman said his primary concern is in farm storage situations among farmers who are new to the business of

growing and storing wheat. Many farmers are growing wheat this year who previously produced other crops.

"In addition to keeping the grain separated, farmers must continually watch their stored damp wheat. Moisture creates heat and continued sprouting. Pockets of heat in stored grain should be removed or stirred to allow the moisture to escape," he said.

He added, "Any wheat stored on the ground should be covered with a rain-proof fabric high enough above the grain to allow moisture in the grain to escape and prevent condensation."

Sprouted wheat, while not harmful in any way, produces an inferior flour not suitable for use in some of Oregon's key markets but in Japan, it is used to make noodles.

Condon man replaces Morgan

Gov. Bob Straub has announced the appointment of William G. Jaeger, Condon, to a five-year term on the Oregon Wheat Commission. Jaeger will fill the position that has been held by Milton Morgan, Ione, who June 30, 1976 completed two terms on the commission.

The new commission member operates a 4,100 acre ranch where he raises wheat, barley and cattle. A native of The Dalles, he has lived in Oregon all of his life and been farming ever since he was old enough to do farm work. He attended Condon schools and attended Oregon State University for two years. Jaeger is a past president of the Oregon Wheat Growers League; on the board of directors of the Bank of Eastern Oregon and the South Gilliam County Fire

District; and a member of and past exalted ruler of Condon Lodge B.P.O.E.

New bus stop law in effect

Once school begins this year, the new stop law and the amber and red flashing lights on buses will be one of the most important new laws to concern the motoring public.

The flashing amber lights are turned on to warn that the bus is about to stop on the roadway to load or unload children. When the red lights begin to flash, drivers meeting or overtaking the bus must stop until the lights are turned off.

Flashing amber and red lights are also permitted on buses used to transport workers in which case the same stop law applies.

The flashing lights on school buses may be used only when stopped on the roadway for purposes of loading and unloading. They may not be used when the bus is pulled completely off the roadway.

Morrow County buses will run at the regularly scheduled time on the morning of Sept. 7 which is the first day of school for Morrow County students.

All buses are equipped with the new lighting system.
