Houghton (Irrigon) for a.m. kindergarten at 9 a.m. on Sept. 20.

Speech, language, and hearing services are provided free of charge by the Umatilla IED to the public school students of Umatilla and Morrow counties. During the 1975-76 school year, approximately 500 children received communications services on a regular basis.
