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A new school bus stop law in Oregon will get its first major test when schools open this fall.

SCHOOL BUSES Oregon school buses are equipped with flashing amber and flashing red lights near the top of the bus on the front and rear.

Flashing Amber WARNING
The flashing amber lights are turned on by school bus drivers to warn other traffic that the bus is about to stop on the road to load or unload children.

STOP HERE

Flashing Red STOP
When the red light begins to flash, you must stop before reaching the bus and remain stopped until the flashing red lights are turned off.

This rule applies if you are on an undivided highway with two lanes, three lanes or four lanes of traffic.

There is one exception to the school bus stop law. If you are on a divided highway with two roads separated by a median strip or barrier you must stop only if you are on the same road as the bus. A painted median strip does not create two separate roads.

The new law requires traffic either overtaking or meeting a school bus to stop when the bus stops to load or unload children and the driver is using flashing red lights on the front and rear of the bus. The old law permitted traffic meeting the bus to proceed with caution if the highway had two or more lanes in each direction.

To go along with the new law school officials say that Oregon school buses were equipped during the summer with what is known as the eight-light warning system...two flashing amber and two flashing red lights near the top of the bus on the front and rear.

Flashing amber lights are turned on by school bus drivers to warn traffic that the bus is about to stop on the road to load or unload children. When the red lights begin to flash the Oregon Driver's Manual says the drivers meeting or overtaking the bus from either direction must stop before reaching the bus and remain stopped until the flashing red lights are turned off.

The Motor Vehicles Division says there is only one exception to the school bus stop law. Drivers on a divided highway must stop only if they are following the school bus on the same road. A divided highway has two roads separated by a median strip or barrier, and DVM officials caution that under the new law a painted median strip does not create two separate roads.

School bus drivers are not permitted to use the flashing lights when stopped at an intersection where traffic is controlled by a red-yellow-green traffic light or when the bus is pulled completely off the road to load or unload passengers.

Officials said drivers should keep alert for the warning lights. School bus drivers have been trained on when and how to use the lights and any time the amber lights begin to flash drivers should get ready to stop.

More than half the states already use the eight-light system on school buses, officials said. The federal safety standard for pupil transportation also requires that flashing red lights on school buses be used only when buses are actually stopped to load or unload children.
