Church Centennial

Invitations to Centennial Weekend events have gone out to many out-of-town individuals and to members of United Methodist Churches in neighboring communities.

The most distinguished guest expected for the United Methodist centennial celebration will be Bishop Jack M. Tuell, a bishop of the world-wide United Methodist Church and the resident bishop of the Portland area, which includes the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference and the Alaska Missionary Conference. This will be his first visit to Heppner.

Tuell, whose experience includes being a lawyer, a pastor, an administrator and an author, was elected to the office of bishop in 1972. He has traveled over most of the world in recent years. This fall he attended the World Methodist Conference in Dublin, Ireland.

Bishop Tuell is a native of Tacoma, WA. His educational background includes two degrees from the University of Washington, a Bachelor of Science in Law, 1947, and a Bachelor of Law, 1948. He gained the Bachelor of Sacred Theology from Boston University, School of Theology, 1955, Magna cum laude, and was named Jacob Sleeper Fellow on graduation. He also holds a Master of Arts (Philosophy) from the University of Puget Sound, 1961, and a Doctor of Divinity (Honorary) from Pacific School of Religion, 1966.

Bishop Tuell will make two public appearances here this weekend. He will speak informally after the Saturday evening potluck dinner in the church basement, and he will deliver the sermon at the centennial worship service on Sunday morning.

Grace Drake, who is minister of the U.M. churches at Union and North Powder, expects to be here for the Saturday dinner and program, but will be back with her churches on Sunday.

All Heppner people are cordially invited to join the potluck at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, and-or to drop in about 8 p.m. to hear Bishop Tuell. Historic mementoes will be on display in the church basement Saturday evening and after church on Sunday.

Steven A. Tollefson, pastor; Mike Howell, liturgist; and Pauline Miller, organist, will join Bishop Tuell in taking part in the Sunday morning worship service at 11 a.m. Members of the congregation and any visitors who wish are encouraged to wear historical costumes on Saturday evening and Sunday morning.
