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Vehicle to arrive soon

Boardman gets ambulance

An ambulance service is about to start at Boardman.

Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) have banded together in the small but rapidly growing community to bring the city its first ambulance service.

The vehicle is expected to arrive any day.

"We have needed something like this for years and years," said EMT Gunnar

Skoubo, Boardman. "I can't say how great it feels that it's really coming."

Lt. Grant Asher of the Hermiston Police Department has already given 15 Boardman residents EMT training.

"We're similar to paramedics but not so involved," Skoubo said in explaining the function of an EMT. "Our training is in assisting an injured person and transport-

ing him until we can get to a doctor."

"We're not trained for intravenous injections," said Skoubo. "Rather we're involved in taking blood pressure and respiration, judging injuries and giving cardio pulmonary and mouth-to-mouth resuscitation when needed. We are there to sustain life and make a person comfortable until a doctor can take over."

EMTs will be providing the service with the aid of county financing. Most of the hospital cases will be taken to hermiton. A charge for the use of the ambulance is being proposed, similar to the Hermiston ambulance co. EMTs will work on a voluntary basis.

"The city fathers are against this idea because they are afraid of the city being sued,"

Skoubo said. "But as long as we don't charge for our services using us wouldn't do anyone any good. We are working on the good samaritan law. We won't be doing anything we haven't been trained for."

Presently the two ambulances in the area are stationed 50 miles apart, one in Hermiston and the other at Heppner.

"Now that distance will be cut in half," Skoubo noted. "Right now it takes an ambulance at least 30 minutes to get here. That's 30 wasted minutes as far as I'm concerned. There was an accident involving six boys a while

Booster shots needed

The State Health Department has recommended that all individuals between the ages of 18-25 years receive two doses of swine flu vaccine to assure their maximum protection. This booster shot should be given at least 30 days after receiving the first one; a few days longer will not make any difference.

The Morrow County Health Department has scheduled follow-up swine flu clinics in all locations for those individuals needing this booster and anyone else who has not yet received their swine flu shot.

They are out of regular flu vaccine and do not expect any more, so that type will no longer be available.
