School to be annexed

Before long, Heppner High School will be an incorporated part of the city of Heppner. Monday night, at the regular Dec. Heppner common council meeting, the council decided to accept an annexation request from the school. The proposal will be sent on to the planning commission and then run its course through ordinance and hearing sessions.

At present, the city limits pass through the middle of the HHS gym. If there were a

fire there, Mayor Jerry Sweeney said, it wouldn't be known whether to bill the city or rural fire department.

It won't make much difference to the city police department. According to Dean Gilliam, chief of police, Heppner police patrol the high school area anyway.

Gilliam said the police department would not be in a position to leave an officer at the school for special functions such as ball games, but would continue to patrol the school property.

The area in question is guessed to be about 10-15 acres, according to HHS Principal, Jim Biers.

Residents of the Blue Mountain Community College district who have not yet responded to the college's opinion survey were asked today by President Ron Daniels to complete the questionnaire and return it to the college as soon as possible.

The survey was directed by the Board of Education to help establish long-range plans and

to indicate local needs which the college can fill.

Distributed by the Pendleton East-Oregonian Tuesday to both subscribers and non-subscribers, the questionnaire is important to the college and the people of Umatilla and Morrow Counties, Daniels said.

"We would like to have a heavy response from our citizens so our plans can reflect the wishes of the public," Daniels added. "The college has historically planned its programs and services according to the needs of the people," he continued, "and we want to continue that practice."

The questionnaire is self-addressed and postage is paid by the college.

Tour set

The Morrow County School Board members will spend Saturday, Dec. 11, in a tour of the new buildings now being completed in the district.

The Board will visit four new classrooms in the Riverside High School at Boardman and the eighth classroom addition at A.C. Houghton Elementary in Irrigon before noon.

The group will then journey to Lone and Heppner to view the new shop buildings in the two communities. The Board also expects to take a drive-by tour of some of the new developments within the county.

BMCC enrollment decline could lean on '77' budget

If Blue Mountain Community College's enrollment continues to fall in the next two terms, the resultant decline in

revenue could have a serious impact on next year's budget. This was the essence of President Ron Daniels' re-

marks here last night at the first budget committee meeting.

"About half of the college's revenue comes from student enrollment, either directly from tuition or from the state based on enrollment," Daniels said, "and for the first time since community colleges were established in Oregon the two-year schools suffered enrollment drops last term."

"Our problem isn't as serious as some of the colleges," Daniels continued, "but if our winter term enrollment is substantially below that of a year ago our receipts will suffer materially. If this occurs we may have to curtail some budgeted items this year and ask for a larger increase in tax levy next year than we would like."

Daniels said it was too early to make any meaningful projections, but that he would

have a better picture of the budget situation when the budget message is delivered Feb. 8.

The committee elected Bill Etter, Pilot Rock, chairman, and named Ben Holdman, Pendleton, secretary. Other members of the committee are: Homer Hughes, Lexington; Bob Mautz and Bob Stangler, both of Pendleton; Wally Wedin, Milton-Freewater; Ralph Skoubo, Boardman, and members of the college Board of Education. They are: Ken Dauble, Weston, chairman; Joe Green and Jim Whitney, Pendleton; Bob Rietmann, Lone; Harmon Springer, John Hansell and Malachi Campbell, all of Hermiston.

The budget committee also approved Apr. 19, 1977, as the election date on the budget. Budget meetings were scheduled for Feb. 8, 15 and 22.

Band survivor honored

The sole survivor of the famed John Phillip Sousa band was honored recently at the "Cavalcade of Music" concert by the internationally acclaimed NORAD Command Band of Colorado Springs, Colo.

Mr. Herman R. Dean, father of Mrs. Dick Wilkinson of Heppner, was guest conductor at the concert, which was dedicated to him in Panama City, Fla. Mr. Dean was clarinetist in Sousa's Naval Band at Great Lakes, Ill., in 1917-18. Having made a career of music in the Navy for 30 years, Mr. Dean retired from the service, obtained his

music degree at the Universities of Oregon and Florida, and entered the public school system of Florida, where he organized several high school bands and served in the music field until he retired in 1968.

Known as the "Dean" of organized school bands in the Florida Panhandle, he still works closely with all band directors in the area and performs instrument for music students in local and area bands.

Remember Aunt Sammy?

Do you remember baked cucumbers, wilted dandelion greens, pan-fried corn rabbit, scalloped onions and peanuts...or even green tomato pie?

If you can, you're remembering Aunt Sammy's recipes from the 1920s and 1930s. Menus carried such items often in those days, and people were listening to "Aunt Sammy's Housekeepers Chats" on their radios.

Aunt Sammy was created by the United States Department of Agriculture and was supposed to be the wife of Uncle Sam. That radio program dates back to Oct. of 1926.

At that time, recipes were compiled and distributed as a cookbook. Now, 50 years later, Aunt Sammy's famous old radio recipes are available again.

They are available at the Morrow County Extension Service, slightly updated, and with some newer favorites added by the USDA Agriculture Research Service.

You can recognize the bulletin by the cover, which depicts a radio typical of the twenties, according to Birdine Tullis, extension service.

For your children: Jobs demand kilowatts.

It is conservatively estimated the number of people entering the job market will exceed people retiring from jobs by 800,000 in the next 20 years.

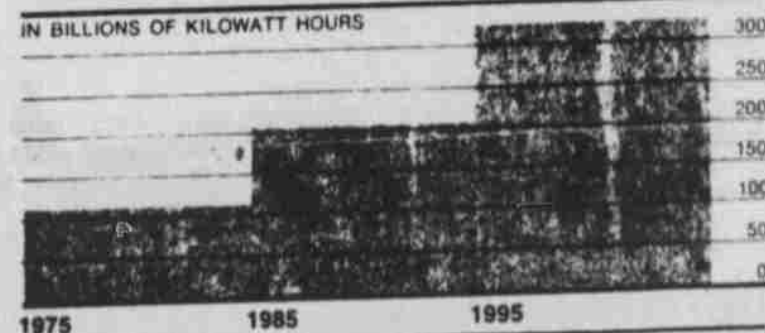
These are people already born, the children of today's labor force in the Northwest. Even more jobs will be needed to meet the demand created by people moving into the region.

The total electric energy requirement of the industrial-commercial sector is calculated to reach 175 billion kilowatt hours by 1995. This is triple the needs of today, according to Bonneville Power Administration.
