Farm, business persons honored

More than 200 persons stuffed into the Heppner Elks' Lodge last Friday night to honor city and county award winners in the Farm-City Banquet.

The evening affair topped off an all day Morrow County Livestock Growers Association meeting.

Many of the awards were already public before the night's presentations. Bert Huff, vice president of First National Bank of Oregon, was the guest speaker. (See additional story.)

Honored during the evening ceremonies were Gary Grieb, Cattleman of the Year; Tom and Roy Martin, Conservationists of the Year; Jean Bennett, a special award from the Morrow County Cowbells as past president; and numerous 4-H and FFA carcass awards.

# Boardman councilman praised

"I just don't know," is all Dewey West could say when questioned about his second award for community service since 1968.

"I don't know who was on the committee, nor what the award is really for aside from community service. But most of all, I don't know why I got it because there are so many others more deserving."

A Friday night banquet of the East Central Oregon Association of Counties awarded West with another public service award. Not only was it his second such honor, it was also the second time he was not present to receive it.

"This happened in 1968 when I got the same award, I had to be somewhere then to," said West.

Prior to his 14 years as mayor of Boardman, West served for 14 years on the city

council. He also distinguished himself during his office as president of League of Oregon Cities during 1972-73.

The league is made up of elected officials from all Ore-

gon communities. "It was a little unusual for the mayor of such a small community to serve as president," said West. He entered his presidential post just following a recovery from heart failure between 1970 and 71.

"Recognition is something you really don't think about," said West. "You have a job to do and you do the best you can. When somebody does

take notice, it's a little bit of a shock. But those shocks always seem to come when you're down. I must admit that in my 30 years of service I've been disenchanted once or twice. But I really appreciate this."

West will be trading his duties as mayor with mayor-elect councilman Jerry Peck in January. He will then return to a councilman's seat.

A public hearing on a proposed supplemental budget for the City of Heppner for the fiscal year 1976-1977 will be held in the council chambers in City Hall at 8:00 p.m. on Dec. 20, 1976. Copies of the supplemental budget are available without charge at the office of the City recorder. The budget may be inspected by interested persons at the office of the City recorder during regular office hours. Any person may appear at the public hearing on the supplemental budget, and discuss the budget or any part of it. Published Dec. 9, 1976.

NOTICE OF HEARING Notice is hereby given that the State Department of Agriculture, Salem, Oregon, will hold a public hearing as a part of its consideration in the establishment of a Mint Disease Control Area Order in Morrow County, for the control and eradication of Verticillium wilt disease caused by pathogens *Verticillium* spp. The proposed control area order would provide certain restrictions and conditions in Morrow County: (a) only allow a change of ownership of propagation mint root

stock within the control area if such stock is Oregon State University Certified 1 or better or has been certified by the department; (b) limit importation of mint root stocks into the control area to Oregon State University Certified 1 or better root stocks; (c) require mint growers in the control area to submit mint field maps indicating the location and certification of the mint root stock; (d) require mint growers to retain documentation of mint root stock sources and maintain maps of new plantings; (e) provide for inspection of mint fields by the department if such are not eligible for Oregon State University certification. The proposed control area order is based upon the provisions of ORS 570.405 to 570.435 and upon the apparent need to establish such a control program in Morrow County.

A public hearing has been set for Thursday, Jan. 20, 1977, at 2 p.m., in the Morrow County Courthouse, Heppner, Oregon. Any person desiring to remonstrate against the establishment of the proposed control area order or to submit facts, data or evidence concerning the same, may do so by attending the hearing. Mr. Bill Wright, Plant Division, Oregon State Department of Agriculture, is the duly appointed Presiding Officer for this matter. Copies of the proposed control area order may be obtained by directing a request therefore to Mr. Wright at the departmental headquarter-

ters at the Agriculture Building, Salem, Oregon 97210.
