'Ragtime' reviewed

Marion Abrams chose "Ragtime" by E.L. Doctorow for a recent book review. The review was presented at the group's Feb. 8 meeting in the home of member Gene Starks. Mrs. Abrams gave a short

review of Doctorow's life and experiences before describing and reading from his 1976 Book-of-the-Month Club selection. Film rights to the book were sold at the time of its publication. Doctorow's 1971 successful

"The Book of Daniel" was set in the Bronx neighborhood where he grew up; "Ragtime" also has a New York City background, principally in the suburb of New Rochelle, where the author now lives with his wife and three children.

"Ragtime" is a strange blend of actuality and modern mythology. It deals with several families whose lives are interwoven with famous persons of their time, the years between 1902 and 1917, "the final days of America's privileged childhood" just before W.W.I.

Time Magazine's reviewer states, "Eccentrics still putter in their garages and produce inventions without the aid of research-and-development bureaucracies. Henry Ford's new assembly line and Albert Einstein's peculiar idea that the universe is curved crack the dawn of the modern age. Before long, Doctorow notes, painters in Paris will be putting two eyes on one side of the head.

"Like ragtime, the jazz form made famous by Scott Joplin, Doctorow's book is a native American fugue, rhythmic, melodic and stately, and as it is never right to play ragtime fast, the same can be said for reading this book."

Historic and fictional figures, fictional events and historic events are fantastically interwoven throughout this story of an upper-middle-class white family and an emotional black musician, whose lives become involved with such well-known personages as Stanford White, Sigmund Freud, Harry Houdini, J.P. Morgan and Henry Ford.

"Ragtime" is published by Random House, has 271 pages and sells for \$8.95.

Movie slated at Assembly of God church

"Corrie: Behind the Scenes with THE HIDING PLACE," a new full-length color release from World Wide Pictures, will be shown at the Assembly of God Church, 197 Willow, on Sunday evening, Feb. 20. A single showing is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m.

"The Hiding Place," a true story filmed in Holland and other European locations, is based on the experiences of Corrie ten Boom, who, with her father, sister, and brother, provided refuge for countless Jewish families. A secret room was constructed in their home as a hiding place for use during Gestapo raids. The ten Booms' activities were discovered, and they were sent to

prisons and concentration camps.

Kenneth Bliss, director of World Wide Pictures, said that the film "offers a great lesson in the perseverance of a personal faith in a very dark and trying period of world history. Corrie ten Boom, now in her eighties, has a tremendous vitality, a deep spiritual commitment, and a profound love for her fellow man. We believe we have succeeded in transmitting a part of her zest, personality, and source of strength through this film."

Bliss noted that the film includes "interesting sidelights on the experiences of the cast and crew during the filming.

The Reverend W. Duane Geyer, Assembly pastor, stressed that the showing of "Corrie" is open to the public free of charge. "We encourage families to plan to attend together, for what we believe will be a memorable experience," he said.
